Thomas declares that after the passage of the separation law antiquaries of Paris, some of them millionaires, hired him and others to bribe parish priests to surrender the relics and substitute counterfeits, which could later be turned over to the State. This plan continued for months, and Thomas finally went boldly into wholesale burglary. Thomas estimated the amount of his robberies at about \$400,000.
