Local Option.

From reports received at the office of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance in Toronto, it is learned that there is likely to be another tremendous Local Option campaign in the Province of Ontario this fall and winter.

The Secretary of the Alliance, Rev. Ben H. Spence, has headed out a list of 89 municipalities in which campaigns are more or less advanced, and it is likely that this list will yet be added to.

During the past few years there has been a great advance in the movement for bar-room abolition by the Local Option method in the Province of Ontario. Within the past six years 191 municipalities have polled a majority for Local Option By-Laws. Last year the three-fifths requirement prevented coming into force 44 of these municipalities and in some other places the by-laws were quashed in the Province. There were at present in the Province 163 municipalities in which the law is operative, but there are 183 other municipalities in the Province in which no licenses are granted for various reasons.

According to figures furnished by the Alliance Secretary, a striking feature of the Local Option by-law is that when Local Option by-laws are passed in a municipality they stay passed. There seems to be an almost unanimous approval of the measure by municipalities that have adopted. Last year there were 84 municipalities where by-laws had been in force for three years or more, and where, therefore, a repeal vote could have been brought on. In 18 places repeal was tried, but in only one instance was it successful, and there, (the Town of Shelton), the temperance people claim that the circumstances were exceptional.

During the past six years out of 150 chances to repeal Local Option by-laws by a simple majority vote, there has been only one successful and that is Shelton. On the face of it, there would therefore, seem to be good ground for a contention that the condition of Local Option is a much more permanent one than that of license.

Asiatic Peril to National Life.

The Globe of Friday last had an able leading article showing a far more serious objection to Asiatic immigration than that raised by labor unionists or employers of labor whose objections were merely local or temporary. The writer sees a danger to Democracy leading to national decay. We quote part of this thoughtful article:

Democracy is a mental quality. It is a characteristic of the intellect, whether of the individual or of the nation, not a mere external form of political organization. Democracy means thinking and acting for one's self, whether in politics or in society or in business or in religion. Democratic government cannot be taken on from without, it must be the expression of the instincts and aptitudes from within. Anglo-Saxon democracy is the outgrowth of the Anglo-Saxon intellect. Apart from that type of intellect there could not have been and there cannot long continue that type of national life and government.

And it is because the Asiatic intellect is so radically different from the Anglo-Saxon, and so devoid of the democratic instinct, that the experiment of making citizens of Canada out of Chinese or Japanese or Hindus is hopeless, and if allowed on a large scale would be fatal. There is no use to talk about superiority and inferiority. In certain important respects the Oriental, especially the Chinese, is not the inferior of the Canadian. But there is a difference so radical and so persistent that attempts at coalition only destroy what is most worth preserving in both.

It is on this radical difference in the very essentials of character, and on the supreme needs of democratic government, that the argument against Oriental settlement in Canada should be based. That is the chief argument, and it carries with it no ground of offence to Japanese, Chinese, or Hindus.

Those orientals belong to a civilization developed through the centuries along lines that never once touched the plane of democracy as it is known in the United States and Canada. That civilization suits the Oriental mind because it is the outgrowth and expression of the Oriental life, but between it and the democracy of Canada a great and impassable gulf is fixed. And the rule works both ways. The foreign settlements in the treaty ports of the Orient are as great a mistake, as hopeless a failure, as is any Chinatown in America. There may be reciprocal trade, there may be travel, but in the deeper things that enter into national life East is East and West is West. A Canadian in China may adopt the Chinese dress, but he can never take on the Chinese life. Neither China nor Japan can ever be run into the mould of American democracy, and for their own sakes those nations should stand against the interference of our democratic ideas, which are alien and antagonistic to their instincts and life—just as we should stand against any further increase of Oriental settlements in Canada. Each nation has its own function to perform, and if at this stage in its development Canadian life in any Province is dominated by alien elements our national character will suffer loss and our contribution to the world's civilization will not be creditable to Canada or useful to the world.
