SCHOOL LIBRARIES—SELECTION OF BOOKS AND HOW TO USE THEM.

The habit of reading good books has been the making of many men. We find in reading the biographies of successful men that much of the inspiration that spurred them on to success was, with many of them, received from some good literature read in youth or early manhood.

It has been generally supposed that as far as social, intellectual and religious advantages are concerned, the town is in advance of the country; but it may be fairly questioned whether there is any barrier to seriously hinder the full development of social and intellectual life in the country.

The first problem is, how to secure the money to be raised, but it is not hard to get a library when the teacher, pupils and parents all want it. The teacher should try to so teach that the trustees, parents and pupils will see that a library is indispensable.

The teacher has more to do with children's reading than most teachers are aware of. It is a high royal privilege to be consulted about a child's reading, and it is one that should never be abused. Therefore great care should be exercised in selecting the books for a school library, as money is often wasted in buying poor books.

How to use the library is another vital part of the library question. What will it profit a man if he have all the books in all the libraries and do not use them? Books of themselves avail nothing. It is in their use that they accomplish good.

All boys love power and admire every exhibition of personal and national strength. They admire the heroes whose names are immortalized upon the pages of history, but many of them may conceive the notion that the wearing of a uniform, the carrying of a sword or a gun, the shedding of blood, and the acquisition of military renown are the only ways in which a boy may really distinguish himself in life.

It is a mistake to think, too, that the child must be continually fed with fresh reading matter, that a book once read is finished, nor does a child lose interest in a good book after a single reading. Therefore, reading of good books is to be encouraged. It is not difficult to get pupils to read if we give them the right kind of reading. No two pupils will read the same kind of books.

If a few well-chosen books are purchased, they will lead the way to a larger library, and if the pupils and parents learn to enjoy reading and have read all the books in the library they naturally will want more, and whoever has acquired a taste for good books can never be induced to read poor ones, as the best drives out the poorest.
