Several residences in the immediate vicinity of the works were almost completely destroyed, the inmates fortunately escaping serious injury.

The magazine building was a onestorey brick on a concrete foundation. it was some 20x30 feet, and all that now remains is a hole in the ground big enough to engulf it.
