GIRL'S TESTIMONY FAVORS ALLEGED SLAYERS OF MOTHER.

Ordeal Fails to Shake Faith of Daughter in Her Father and Stepmother.

Deatur, Hill, Oct. 21.—Marguerite Magill was on the witness stand to-day in defence of her father and stepmother, accused of murdering her mother, Mrs. Pet Magill, on the night of May 30th last. This pretty doll-like girl was questioned by attorneys for three hours. Never for the slightest fraction of a minute did she lose her composure. And it is common comment here to-day that she has saved her father from a penitentiary sentence.

PETROLEA DISASTER.

WAS A TREMENDOUS EXPLOSION OF NITRO-GLYCERINE.

Magazine of the Torpedo Company Blown Up—Several Buildings Damaged and Much Glass Broken, but Only One Man Hurt—Loss Will Be Heavy.

Petrolea despatch: At present no cause can be ascribed for the explosion of the nitro-glycerine magazine of the Petrolea Torpedo Company. The liquid was thought to be packed properly. In any event a searching investigation is promised by the authorities.

BURN HERETICS.

Retired Preacher Pleads for Torch as a Cure. Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 21.—The Rev. Dr. Robert M. Patterson, a minister of the Presbyterian Church, who is well known in Albany, Chicago and Philadelphia, and who has lived in Malvers, a suburb of this city, since his retirement from the ministry several years ago, caused an uproar in the Presbytery that met here to-day by declaring that the death penalty should be inflicted upon all heretics, unrepentant and corresponding in all diverse cases.

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WONDERS OF THE WIRELESS.

Overseas Message from Sir Wilfrid and Others. One Has Gone Astray—Cable to the London Mail Elicits the Fact That the Message Sent to That Paper Had Not Been Received.

Glare Bay, N.S., despatch: This afternoon at Port Morien the commercial wireless service between Canada and Ireland was inaugurated by Signor Marconi. The messages exchanged to-day were sent by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Lord Strathcona, Sir Hiram Maxim, the Lord Mayor of London and other notable men, and the first newspaper to get a story from the other side was the New York Times.

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A CREEPY FEELING.

"Creep" Under N. S. W. Mine Causes Heavy Damage. Sydney, N. S. W., Oct. 21.—Despatches from Newcastle state that a serious "creep" has occurred in the old mine workings under the residential quarter of that city. Buildings on an area of 15 acres are affected and the damage so far is estimated at half a million dollars. There have been no casualties.

THE MISSING SHOCK.

The Earthquake Was a Sequake Near Hawaiian Islands. Berkeley, Cal., Oct. 21.—Prof. A. E. Louschner, of the observatory of the University of California, announced that the centre of the earthquake disturbance felt on the Pacific coast on Wednesday afternoon was a tidal wave. Reports of the shock will probably be brought in by incoming ships.

SIX KILLED.

And Ten Seriously Hurt in a Street Car Collision. Chattanooga, Tenn., Oct. 21.—A street car collision occurred on Harrison avenue early this morning. It is reported five or six persons have been killed.

SOUL-MATES ARE INSANE.

Preacher and Wife of Electrotypist Offended Public Decency. New York, Oct. 21.—King's County Hospital physicians have declared both Rev. Maxwell Walton, pastor of St. Lucas German Evangelical Lutheran Church, of Williamsburg, and Mrs. Dorah Bauer, his wife, insane. The couple were discharged in police court to-day. Mrs. Bauer, who is the wife of Louis A. Bauer, an electrotypist, and the minister were arrested a few days ago, charged with offending public decency and were committed to hospital until inquired into, as they had declared themselves to be "soul-mates." Relatives took them in charge on their release.

ELK AT RIVERDALE ZOO KILLS BIG SCOTCH BUCK IN BATTLE.

Toronto, Oct. 21.—The elk at Riverdale Zoo killed the Scotch buck in a fight through the fence in the paddock yesterday morning. The tragedy was the outcome of ill-feeling of some months' standing, and the stricken deer was pierced in the head by the elk's antler stood on its own side of the fence in the duel, but the Scotch deer had been debauched after killing a doe a year ago, and he was at a disadvantage in the death struggle. The elk at High Park is said to be becoming cross, and fears are entertained that he may break down his fence and injure some person.

THE WOLF BOUNTIES.

Over Seven Thousand Dollars Paid Out So Far This Year. Toronto, Oct. 21.—Up to the end of September the Provincial Treasurer had paid out \$7,380 in wolf bounties, for the appropriation made at the last session of the Legislature was \$8,000. Last year the total paid for the whole twelve months was \$8,367. The Government pays \$15 for every wolf killed in the unorganized districts, and \$6 of the \$15 which is paid by counties for wolves killed in the organized sections of the Province.

LOPERS WERE CAUGHT.

Young Londoner's Bride Held by Her Parents. Crystal City, Man., Oct. 21.—Some months ago Miss Potter, of this town, was clandestinely married to Jos. Lawrence in London, Ont., and her parents took prompt action to separate the young lovers. The bride was brought home and Lawrence was put under legal restraint. Last night another runaway was planned by Lawrence and his bride, and a start was made for the boundary, but her irate father overtook them three miles from home and another sudden rude separation followed.



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
