"TO HIM THAT OVERCOMETH."

(By Rev. Theodore L. Cuyler, D. D.) There is a glowing list of rewards promised in the New Ttestament "to him that overcometh." They are enough to fire every Christian heart and more than satisfy his highest aspirations. They are the spiendid crowns laid up in heaven for all those who, through Jesus Christ, come off conquerors. But the fighting and the crown-winning have got to be done down here in this world. Conversion by the Holy Spirit does not end the warfare; it really only begins it. Converting grace is a free gift, but it is not a crown. Just as soon as you give your heart to Jesus, you are enlisted for a conflict, and a conflict that will continu until the last blow is struck. You will not reach heaven before your time. When we enlist for Jesus, He furnishes us our weapons, and commands us to put on the whole armor; if any part is left exposed to the enemy, that point is the point of danger.

Of one thing you may rest assured, and that is in a genuine, earnest Christian life conflict is unavoidable; you cannot escape it if you would. Conversion to the core, which is the only conversion worth having, means a declaration of war; it is a challenge to the devil. The only way to avoid a fight with him is to carry a dark lantern, and be content to creep along-in a by-way with soft mocensins under your feel. Even there Satan manages to discover the cowards and the time-servers, and make them ground arms or surrender. Out of the vast number of church members in our land, I wonder how many there are who can report themselves every morning to their Master as "fit for duty"? How many of them begin each day by grasping the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, and putting on the shield of faith and prayer? We never know what day may be a day of special temptation and assault by the adversary, and the times in which we lay our armor off and over-estimate our own strength are the disastrous days in our life record.

Dangerous as the devil is, dangerous as worldly amusements are, the most dangerous enemy that we often have to conquer walks in our own shoes. He already begins to wear the white raiment, and the omniscient eye of God discerps on his brow the first flashings of the victor's crown.

Almighty Father, God and Lord of all, Then seest the evil which is in the strong those principalities and powers thou dost call us to this conflict and dost bid us fight against our enemies and Thine. Because Thou carest for us. because it is Thy will that we should be savud from sin and death, because the battle is Thine as well as ours, we are confident that Thou wilt give us victory over our foes. Increase our faith and help us to do valiantly as we contend with our besetting sins and as we face the ranks of evil. Save us from selfconfidence. Give us grace to listen for Thy voice and to obey all Thy commands. And when the long campaign is over, bring us to the rest of heaven, through Christ who is our life. Amen.

Of all these empirical procedures the most widespread and the one still most employed in popular medicine in the application of cold. The most available source of cold, because it is everywhere procurable, is water, consequently it has oftenest been employed, In epistaxis the ancient physicians advised bathing the face with very cold water and causing it to be held in the mouth; they also soaked the hands and

feet in cold water. On the theory that cold things restrain hemorrhage many persons replaced watby solid cold objects and hung about the neck of the patients attacked with epistaxis coral, jasper, yellow amber, marble or articles of iron. Physicians pointed out, indeed, certain regions with which it was preferable to make the contact. They realized that it was the coldness of the object, not its nature, that

did the work; no special property must be attributed to the iron, said Guyon-Dolois, for chains of gold, silver or lead would serve the same purpose. In popular medicine, however, iron has remained the material most employed in nasal hemorrhages, and the application of the key to the back in largely resorted to in the household. Possibly the cold key has no other haemastatic power than what is connected with the sensation of cold which it produces; a cold compress would probably act with more certainty, but it would be difficult to dethrone the key, which one always has in one's pocket. TROUSERS OF RECENT ORIGIN. A Hundred Years Ago Methodists

pulpit who wears trousers." But this was not all. Some doubts were expressed in many quarters concerning the question whether a man could be religious and appear in trousers. One of the founders of the Primitive Methodist body remarked to a caleague in the ministry that "trousers wearing, beer drinking so and so will never get to heaven.'

Father Rece, a famous Methodist minister, twice president of the conference (born in 1765, died in 1850), could not be induced to adopt trousers, and among the Methodists was the last to follow popular fashion in this respect.
