NEW PRESIDENT.

Next Convention to be at Orillia—Primary Secretary Appointed—Advance of \$2,000 Called For—Lary Teachers Scored—New Life Must Be Nurtured.

Brampton, Oct. 22.—The new President of the Ontario Sunday School Association, elected by adoption of the Executive report this afternoon recommending him, is Mr. E. J. Joseph, Superintendent of the Northern Collegiate at Sunday school, Toronto. The next convention is to be held at Orillia, Oct. 27th to 29th next. The sessions are largely attended. St. Paul's Church, being crowded. The General Assembly of the Executive, presided over by the Chairman, Mr. W. Hamilton, of Toronto, which was held at the Hotel Brantford, as Primary Secretary, the appointment of Miss Anne Taylor of Brampton, as Primary Secretary, the adoption of a department of the Association's work of the International Bible Reading Association, with Dr. J. D. Price, of Toronto, as Honorary Secretary, and the institution of \$100,000 scholarships at \$100 each. (At least two of such memberships were subscribed during the meeting.) For the year ending Oct. 31st, total \$7,200, including almost \$4,000 from counties, \$1,800 from personal subscriptions in Toronto, \$300 from other cities, and \$1,500 from Teachers Training and West-ern Secretaries, \$1,200 from the Ladies and other items, bringing the outlay up to \$9,600. To this item will be added \$200 for "four weeks" salary of the Primary Secretary, who will begin her work in January. Daily contributions and subscriptions were pledged up to about \$3,000.

SAVED HER LIFE.
