There seems no reason why a vote with a similar or eyen larger percentage should not be recorded in January

Only one municipality in the South Riding, Normanby, gave an adverse vote, and the total majority for the Riding was 647.

At the Referendum vote taken over the Province of Ontario on December 4, 1902, Durham voted as follows:
