Plebiscite and Referendum.

On September 29, 1898, Durham voted on the liquor question in the general Plebiscite vote taken all over Canada. There was a majority in every ward, though the vote was a small one. Here are the figures:

Table with 3 columns: Ward, for, against, maj. North ward: 27 for, 11 against, 16 maj. East ward: 41 for, 11 against, 30 maj. West ward: 71 for, 21 against, 50 maj. Total: 139 for, 43 against, 96 maj.

This vote would have carried Local Option even with the 60 per cent handicap, for the percentage above is 76. There seems no reason why a vote with a similar or even a larger percentage should not be recorded in January next.

Only one municipality in the South Riding, Normanby, gave an adverse vote, and the total majority for the Riding was 647.

At the Referendum vote taken over the Province of Ontario on December 4, 1902, Durham voted as follows:

a proportion of 73 per cent. The majority for the riding was 1092 while in 1898 it was only 647.

A much larger vote may be expected this January seeing that, for the first time it is being held at the time of the Municipal elections on a separate ballot. It is to be hoped there will be a full vote of all citizens and certainly the majority should not be less, but more, than in 1898 or 1902. The evil intended to be curbed in these years is not less rampant today, and we think the public sentiment behind the effort to curb the evil is stronger now than then.
