MAY LOSE CITIZENSHIP. Question of U. S. Citizens Who Vote in Canadian Elections.

Winnipeg, Dec. 2.-American citizens who poli a vote in the coming municipal elections forfeit their right to citizenship in the United States by participating in politics foreign to the United States, and become alien to the land of their birth. The question has been raised of late by American citizens who have overlocked the fact that the municipal act provides that only British subjects are entitled to vote, or who claim, as many of them do, that they were not asked as to their nationality when they applied for registration or for the ballot. many cases they did not understand that they had to be British subjects, and considered the ownership of property and payment of taxes the only required qual-
