By-Law No. 535

Of the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Durham:

A By-law to authorize the issue of Debentures of the Town of Durham, in the County of Grey, to the amount of \$4000 for the purpose of building an

erecting a bridge across the Saugeen River, and approaches thereto, at the intersection of the said River and Garrafraxa St in the said Town of Durham.

WHEREAS it is advisable and requisite that a bridge shall be built over the said street, at the intersection of the said River and the Saugeen river in the said Town of Durham:

AND WHEREAS in order thereto it will be necessary to issue Debentures of the said Town of Durham in the County of Grey for the sum of \$4000 as hereinafter provided (which is the amount of the debt intended to be created by this by-law) the proceeds of the said debentures to be applied to the said purpose and to no other:

AND WHEREAS it is desirable to issue the said debentures at one time and to make the principal of the said debt repayable by yearly sums during the period of twenty years: being the currency of the said debentures; and yearly sums being of such respective amounts that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest in respect of the said debt shall be nearly as possible equal to the amount payable in each of the other nineteen years of such period (as shown in schedule "A" hereto annexed):

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate for paying the said debt and interest as hereinafter provided is \$229.97:

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rateable property of the Town of Durham according to the last revised assessment roll thereof is \$722 745:

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debentures of the said Municipality is \$37134 67, whereof no part of the principal or interest is in arrears:

THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Durham, enacts as follows:—

1. The sum of \$4000.00 shall be expended by the Town of Durham in the erecting and building a bridge across the Saugeen River and approaches thereto, at the points where the said River intersects Garrafraxa St in the Town of Durham, and for the purpose of raising the said sum of \$4000.00, debentures of the said Town of Durham to the said amount of \$4000.00 in the whole shall be issued in sums of not less than \$100 each on the first day of September, A. D. 1908, each of which debentures shall be dated on the date of the issue thereof, and shall be payable within twenty years thereafter, namely:—one of each of the said debentures on the first day of the month of October in each year, for twenty years after the passing of this By-law at the office of the Standard Bank of Canada in the said Town of Durham.

2. Each of the said debentures shall be signed by the Mayor of the said Town of Durham, and by the Treasurer thereof, and the Clerk of the said Town of Durham shall attach thereto the Corporate seal of the municipality.

3. The said Debentures shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable yearly at the said bank on the 1st day of October in each and every year during the currency thereof, and shall have attached to them coupons for payment of the said interest, which coupons shall be signed by the Mayor and Treasurer of the said Town of Durham.

4. During the currency of the said debentures there shall be raised annually by special rate on all the rateable property in the Town of Durham, the sum of \$329.97 for the purpose of paying the amount due in each of the said years for principal and interest in respect of the said debt (as shown in the Schedule "A" hereto annexed.)

5. This By-law shall take effect on the day of A. D. 1908.

6. The votes of the electors of the said Town of Durham shall be taken on this By-law at the following times and places, that is to say:—On Monday the 6th of January next, commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the forenoon and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon of the same day, by the following deputy returning officers:—

North Ward at Archibald Davidson's office, by Clifton Elvidge, Deputy Returning Officer.

East Ward at the Town Hall by H H Mookier, Deputy Returning Officer.

West Ward at John Murdoch's office by John South, Deputy Returning Officer.

7. On Saturday the fourth day of January A. D. 1908, the Mayor of the said Town of Durham shall attend at the Council Chamber at ten o'clock in the forenoon to appoint persons to attend at the various polling places aforesaid and at the final summing up of the votes by the Clerk of the persons interested in, and promoting, or opposing the passage of this By-law respectively.

8. The Clerk of the Council of the said Town of Durham shall attend at his office at twelve o'clock in the forenoon of Tuesday the seventh day of January, A. D. 1908, to sum up the number of votes for and against this By-law.
