A Mammoth's Teeth.

Miners excavating near Starunia made a very interesting prehistoric find in the remains of a mammoth in excellent state of preservation. So far, says a Lemtwo teeth, some six feet in length, but in five or six pieces, jaw bones, parts of the vertebrae column, and three or four yards of hide, upon which the hair is still fresh, joints, and other bones. and one foot of the animal.
