### Egremont Council.

Council met Dec 16, minutes sustained. Com. Loshian reported on job in his division, chiefly graveling, amounting to \$50.00. The gravel acc'ts amounted to \$7.40. Fees \$2.00. Com. Ferguson reported a new bridge Lots 7 and 8 Con. 3 by Wm Marshall, cost \$15.25, also a culvert G. A. Con. 14, \$14.00. Com. fees \$3.00. Com. Philp reported various small jobs amounting to \$25.25. Fees \$2.00, also as Inspector of drains and 4. Drain 1 is completed excepting a culvert and spreading excavated material on townline recommended payment of \$362.32, and hold Bond till completed and contractor on Drain 1 be paid \$150.00. An agreement signed by the ratepayers of said drain, certifying to their satisfaction of completion of said Drain was presented. Inspection was requested to have an inspection of Drain 4 made by Engineer, which has been done, and Engineer's report is herewith submitted.

Lothian—Ferguson—Inspector's report adopted and orders granted, also orders for \$250.00 and \$250.00 on drain 4 be given. Inspectors fees \$1.00 each drain, agreement and report to be filed.—Carried.

Com. McArthur reported on two bridges one at Haley's sideroad by H. Reid and Wm Haa's, cost \$56.00. The other on baseline Con. 12 by same party cost \$39.00, also Joe McEachern's draining Sinclair's hill Con. 8, \$5.25; B. McAnley drawing tile and culvert, lot 43, Con. 2, \$6.50. Report adopted and \$3.00. Com. fees paid. Inspector Habb reported that he had paid Jas. Shes contractor of Drain No. 3, \$922.92 for year 1907. Report adopted. Com. fees paid \$6.00 charged to said drain. By-law No. 216 to appoint Dep. R. Officers etc. was passed. The only change being place of polling in Division 5, now to be at Jerry Bark's, Lot 1 Con. 5. Mr. Seaman's acc't amounting to \$17.30 was paid less \$3.90 for cement sacks which will be returned. The time for the completion of drains Nos 2 and 3 was extended to Sept. 1st, 1908. A refund of \$1.00 was made to Mr. S. Queen, J. P., for fines paid in error. J. C. Adams and D. Hunter, Collectors, were each paid \$40.00 in full as salary. D. McIntyre, Assessor, was paid \$5.00 balance of salary and \$1.00 for postage and stationery. By resolution of Council \$158.08 was paid by several small orders. The Reeve paid Treasurer the following acc'ts:—From Jas. Eccles, tile \$5.00, W. G. Boyd refund \$10.00 on grader blade, E. V. Trustees, tile \$11.50, P. Village, Lime and tile \$3.72, C. W. Robb re A. and E. townline \$1.50.

McArthur—Philp—That the Reeve vacate the chair and Dep. Ferguson take the Reeve's place.—Carried.

Philp—Lothian—That this Council tender a very hearty vote of thanks to the Reeve for the very kind and courteous manner in which he has discharged his duties during the past year.—Carried.

The Reeve replied in his usual gentlemanly manner after which Council rose. D. ALLAN, Clerk.
