By-Law No 532

To prohibit the sale of liquor in the Town of Durham in the County of Grey. The Board of Councils of the Town of Durham hereby enacts as follows:

- 1.—That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn or other house or place of public entertainment in the said municipality, and the sale thereof, except by wholesale, is and shall be prohibited in every shop or place other than a house of public entertainment in the said municipality.
- 2.—That the vote of the electors of the said Town of Durham will be taken on the by-law by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named on Monday the sixth day of January, One Thousand and Nine Hundred and Eight, commencing at nine o'clock in the morning and continuing till five o'clock in the afternoon at the undermentioned places:

North Ward at Archibald Davidson's office, by Clifton Eldridge, Deputy Returning Officer.

East Ward at the Town Hall by H. H. Mocker, Deputy Returning Officer.

West Ward at John Murdoch's office by John Smith, Deputy Returning Officer.

3.—That on the fourth day of January 1908, at the Town Hall, in the Town of Durham at the hour of Ten o'clock in the forenoon the mayor shall appoint in writing, signed by himself, two persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the person interested in and desirous of promoting the passing of this by-law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this by-law.

4.—That the Clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Town of Durham shall attend at Town Hall at the hour of Twelve o'clock in the forenoon on the Seventh day of January, A. D. 1908, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-law.

5.—This By-law shall come into operation, and be of full force and effect on and after the first day of May next after the final passing thereof.

NOTICE. Mayor. Take notice that the above is a true copy of a proposed By-law which has been taken into consideration by the Municipal Council of the Town of Durham and which will be finally passed by the said Council (in the event of the assent of the electors being obtained thereunto, as provided by the Liquor License Act) after one month from the first publication thereof in the Durham Review the date of which first publication was Thursday the twelfth day of December, A. D. 1907, and that at the hour, day and place therein fixed for taking votes of the electors the polls will be held.
