TOPICS OF THE WEEK.

Remember to write it 1-9-0-8. Manitoba Provincial government has bought out the Bell Telephone Co. for over \$3,000,000.

The Toronto Globe for publishing a telegram it got from Stratford 1 1/2 years ago, recording dissipated behavior of Dr. Beattie Nesbit, has been charged by that gentleman with defamatory libel and four informations have been sworn out against managing editor, Rev. J. A. McDonald.

Local Option not Tyranny.

Letter from T. C. James, Charlotte-town, P. E. I.

Last week Mr. Farquharson sent to Mr. T. C. James, an old and influential resident of Charlottetown a copy of the advertisement published in the Chronicle on Dec. 19th under the heading "Where local option is Tyranny" and has received from him the following reply:

"Let me say at the outset that in Charlottetown I am not looked upon as a Temperance fanatic. Some of my brethren think me lukewarm, but I refuse to take extreme views even in the Temperance question."

A defendant in a liquor case is not compelled to become a witness against himself. A man arrested for drunkenness can be compelled to state where he procured liquor or be committed for contempt of court. I am not aware that any one has refused to answer—whether they have told the truth or not is another question.

The charge that in Charlottetown the magistrate who tries a liquor case is required by the law to act as prosecutor is absolutely false. There is a public prosecutor who lays the information and retains a lawyer to prosecute if he sees fit. The stipendiary sits as judge and no one, not even the liquor sellers doubts his ability and integrity.

The statement—"Wives in Charlottetown have been compelled to appear against their husbands" is absolutely false. This has never occurred.

Whether wives were ever paid to give evidence against their husbands or not their is no evidence to show. I do not however believe that there is a single instance on record where a wife gave testimony against her husband in a liquor selling case.

That there has been perjury in liquor cases I think is undeniable though, alas, that offence is not confined to liquor cases. Did the law make the perjury or did it merely call out the falseness?

The statement that "the citizens of Charlottetown have long since refused to appear as prosecutors in liquor cases" is incorrect since they never did appear as prosecutors. If they furnish the paid prosecutor with complaint and evidence even their names do not appear.

With regard to the assertion that there are more arrests for drunkenness and that the trade in ardent spirits has increased I call your attention to the number of arrests for drunkenness for the last ten years:

The figures for 1907 are to Oct. 31. Our prohibitory law came in force June 5th, 1901 so that you will see that there has been a steady decrease in the number of arrests for drunkenness with the exception of the year 1903 when we were constructing a bridge which cost about 1 1/2 million dollars.

A few weeks ago I made inquiries in various quarters as to the effect of our present legislation. I was careful to go to moderate men and not emperance cranks. I give the sum of the information I received.

A partner in a leading dry goods firm says collections are better than in past years partly due to less waste of money for liquor. When legislation was first introduced in Charlottetown business fell off because liquor was to be had in other towns but since the whole island is under the same law trade has come back and is now better than ever.

The city assessor who has been many years in the office says that when he began his work there was much poverty, houses badly furnished, children badly clothed and ill fed. Since the introduction of prohibitory legislation there has been a steady improvement which was more marked during the last year. This is largely attributable to the lessened liquor consumption.

A customs official says "not one tenth of the liquor passes through our hands now. It is alleged that the greater part of it comes from St. John and Halifax duty paid, but I am continually around the wharves and I do not see any of it." Steamer agents say far less is imported over their lines.

The Stipendiary Magistrate says there is a marked change for the better. The law removes temptation from our young men. The open saloon with its attractions and comfortable back room was a standing allurements to young men, especially to those coming in from the country. Now the traffic is driven into respectable channels and no man unless he really has the thirst or unless his tastes and habits are degraded will go into these places to hunc for liquor."

My own experience extending now over 36 years in Charlottetown is this: In the days of license, on Market days it was an everyday sight to see long strings of teams standing in front of saloons, the women in the vehicles, the men inside drinking. When they came out almost every man carried a jar to last him till next market day. The roads leading out of town were dangerous, almost impossible to ordinary travellers because so many drunken drivers were going out. Now this is entirely changed. Roads on Market day are as safe as on any other day. Though there are still drunken men they are really few and the arrests are usually about the same old crowd of dead beats that know the haunts and will have the liquor if it is to be got. The condition of our city is unmeasurably better and I am satisfied the law could not be repealed to-day in any
