Future Battleships and Guns. The battleship of the future will be o great size; displacement will be not less than 20,000 tons; and this will increase so rapidly that a 30,000 ton ship will probably be afloat before the close of the next decade. Future engagements will be fought at an extreme range, the extent of which will be limited only by the ability of the fire control officer to see the fall of the shots. The determination of the range at which an engagement shall be fought will lie with the fleet which possesses the faster speed _Scientific American.
