TOPICS OF THE WEEK.

A contest is on in South Huron for a seat in the Dominion House. Mr. M. Y. McLean is the Liberal candidate, a successful journalist with experience in the local House. His chances of winning seems good. But there's no saying.

When Japan beat Russia influenza was set to work the ending of which no man can foresee. One thing plainly is seen: the victory has had the effect of rousing in every Japanese from the highest to the lowest, a bumptious feeling that is not only going to make it hard to get along with them but is proving infectious to the other Asiatic peoples. It seems certain that it is their example, if not their instigation, that is causing part of the unrest in India.

There is an Asiatic trouble in South Africa, Australia and New Zealand both find it necessary to impose exclusion laws, and Australia, in defiance of the British-Jap treaty, proposes to go into the building of a navy of her own, with the avowed purpose of keeping a "white Australia." The United States and Canada both have a Japanese question on their western coasts, and the South American countries on the Pacific are also preparing to resist a possible aggression. When the present treaty of alliance between Britain and Japan expires, it will not be renewed without protests from all the colonies, and perhaps without the buttress of Britain, the Jap may be less aggressive in his attempt to invade new continents.

Local Option Results.

Since our last issue the clearing of the smoke of battle has allowed results to be seen clearly, and there is a decided improvement in the situation.

The winning of 6 out of 7 repeal contests by largely increased majorities is a notable result, showing that when fairly tried the people hang on to it. The one defeat was by 9 majority only, and three years ago it was carried by 4 so that a matter of 7 votes would put it where it was. It should not be forgotten that there were 53 places open to repeal and only 7 tried it, with the above result, and these no doubt were selected as being easy marks.

As a result of this year's vote nearly 100 bar rooms are put out of business. The working of the three-fifths majority clause is, we have always held, not a bad thing for a new law that makes a change in social customs. We are inclined to think it is a good thing for another reason: No fewer than 25 municipalities polled majorities for local option but came short of the 3-5th clause, and in those places the full effect of the deterrent measure is pressed home. There is no denying such failures have an irritating effect that stiffens temperance determination, that will win next time, or bring pressure on parliamentarians to remove the handicap. In these 25 places 86 bar rooms exist, which a majority of rate payers say should be abolished.

Twenty-two places, with 70 bar rooms, failed to get a majority and must now wait three years before an opportunity is again available.

There are now over 300 municipalities in this province under local option, surely an evidence that the tide of time is flowing against the legalized bar room.

Is your Water Supply Pure?

Throughout the town and country, the water supply is often very impure and every household should know, for sure, whether his supply is affected in the least. A little forethought in this respect may often save a future trouble and expense, as contaminated water invariably carries with it germs of the various diseases.

The analytical work necessary to determine whether water contains impurities, requires great skill, but there are a few simple tests that may often determine whether it is worth while to perform a more elaborate analysis.

TEST No 1.—Pour half a pint of water into a wide mouthed bottle or

decanter close tightly and then shake violently. If an offensive odor is then perceived, the water is probably contaminated by sewage or other constituents from similar sources.

TEST No 2.—Add to a sample of water a drop of dilute sulphuric acid and enough potassium permanganate to tinge to a faint rose color. Cover ves el with a glass or saucer and allow to stand for fifteen minutes. If the water does not change to pink, it may be considered unwholesome.

TEST No 3.—Pour a little solution of silver nitrate into a carefully cleaned glass and notice that it remains clear, then pour in the water to be tested, should a strong milkiness appear that is not nearly cleared up on adding a few drops of dilute nitric acid, the water probably contains sodium chloride always found in sewage water but very seldom in wholesome unless near the sea coast.
