New Treaty with France.

A very important matter submitted to the House last week by Hon. Mr. Fielding, Minister of Finance, was the recent treaty with France. To use his own words, the object of the ministers was to keep in view the following purposes:

First—To remove the inequalities of the old treaty and make the conditions fairly reciprocal. Second—To guard against the granting of concessions which would injure any large Canadian interest.

Third—To keep, as far as possible, for British trade the degree of preference established by the tariff policy of last session.

Fourth—To grant to France by a reasonable extent of favored nation treatment, the best treatment which is accorded to any foreign country, and to reserve to Canada the right to make any tariff arrangement which we may see fit with Great Britain or with any British colony.

Fifth—In the granting of any special rates which might be thought desirable, we decided to confine them as far as possible to French specialties which would not be likely to come into competition to any large degree with our industries or with British industries, and to secure favored nation treatment as far as possible in the chief articles of export which we might hope to send abroad.

Sixth—To seek the favored nations treatment in some things, which, though we might not export them, we reasonably hope to export them in the future.

The Local Legislature is called for business on 5 February next and session is likely to be long, combative and interesting. It is almost certain to be the last session of this parliament, dissolution being expected in June. One of the burning questions will be some burning talk on educational measures and on law reform.

Blended Flours and the Big Loaf

Grow Ontario Wheat.

There is every indication that the price for Ontario wheat will steadily advance. The introduction of blended flour has met with complete success wherever Ontario blended flour has been placed on sale—in Toronto for instance and also in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Cape Breton and Prince Edward Island—they have recaptured the market from the Western hard patent flour "to a considerable extent and the good work goes on.

The only drawback to a more sweeping victory is a lack of wheat. Blended flours are principally Ontario flour with a little Manitoba wheat to add the necessary amount of gluten (or strength). This combination makes the "big" loaf of bread of the Western flour—and, at the same time, has the delicate flavor of our best Ontario flour.

With the sale of these blended flour constantly increasing, it would seem that there was good reason for our farmers in Ontario wheat. However, it is the soundest kind of business sense for every farmer, stockman and dairyman in the province to buy blended flour. There are enough users of flour among our agricultural population to keep the mills busy throughout the year. And if the head of every household would see that only blended flour was bought for home baking, there would be an enormous increase in the sale of these flours, and a corresponding increase in the demand for Ontario wheat. Our farmers would then receive money instead of the wheat, and millers out west.

Our stockmen and dairymen will share in the good fortune too. With one miller having a good run over, there will be an abundance of bran and shorts. Instead of paying about twice as much as these feed stuffs are worth, prices would come down to normal and there would be no money in buying and stockmen. As it is, the farm and miller out West seem to be getting all the profit, for, of course, our dairymen and others using large quantities of bran and shorts, have to pay the freight on such stuffs from Manitoba and Alberta. Perhaps not directly, but in the end.

Bentinck Council

Bentinck Council held its first annual meeting for the year 19-8 at Allan Park on Monday, the 18th inst at 8 o'clock, present Jas. S. Wilson, reeve, John F. Dodsworth, Deputy Reeve, Robt. Grierson, Alex. Wilson, Geo. Noble, councillors—after taking the declaration of qualification and after they took their seats at council hours the reeve in the chair Minutes of December read and passed. By-law No. 1 for 1908, appointing the following officers for the present year was duly passed. Thomas Clark and J. W. Vickers, auditors of accounts, Henry Metcalfe member of Board of Health for three years, R. Grierson commissioner for road div No. 1, Geo. A. Noble for No. 2, Alex. Wilson for No. 3 and John F. Dodsworth for No. 4. The reeve has charge of bridges, D. Campbell was appointed clerk and Wan Iremco, treasurer. The reeve and auditor Clark were appointed to examine into the treasurer's accounts and report. The following accounts were ordered to be paid—\$4 each to the Deputy returning officers \$2 each to the poll clerks, \$2 for each polling place and place of nomination, \$4 to H. Pratt for delivering ballot boxes, \$10.00 to the Municipal world for election stationery, \$25 to each of tax collectors, Alfred Redford, Donald Smith and Wan. Martin as salaries for collecting, \$100 to the treasurer as his salary for 1907. The clerk was ordered to get copies of the Municipal world for use of council; the sum of \$300 was appropriated to each of the four road divisions for the improvement of roads. The clerk was instructed to write to Dr. Jamieson, M. P. and the provincial secretary asking them to use their best endeavors to have an act passed empowering municipalities to hold their elections every 2 years and to make their assessments once in 3 years. Council adjourned to meet at Lorne house, Elmwood on Saturday the 15th day of February next at 9 o'clock in the forenoon to appoint assessor, pathmasters, pond keeper, fence viewers, and operator for the grader and for general business.
