Obituary

The following notice of the untimely death of an estimable young lady has been sent us. We sympathize with the father and family who have lately been passing through deep waters:

"Seldom has the community received such a shock as was experienced a few days ago when it was learned that Maggie McKechnie, eldest daughter of Donald McKechnie, of the 8th concession, had passed away on Wednesday Jan. 15th at the early age of 21 years.

For the past two months she had been living in Toronto, and a few days before her death she was taken to Grace Hospital suffering from appendicitis, and her father received word that an operation was to be performed. No serious doubts, however, were entertained as to her ultimate recovery; in fact, after the operation was performed she steadily improved until the day before her death. On the evening of the 14th a change for the worse took place and in spite of all that could be done by loving care, and medical skill, she gradually sank and early the next morning she passed away. Her end was peaceful and happy for the knew that although she was leaving her friends here, she had a better home prepared for her, and that He whom she loved and in whom she trusted was with her and would sustain her.

Her father, who went to Toronto on Monday and was with her until the last, arrived home on Wednesday evening with the remains.

Deceased was a member of the Crawford Presbyterian Church where she will be much missed, her bright, sunny disposition and winning manner having rendered her a general favorite and gained for her friends wherever she went.

Much sympathy is felt for the father, brother and sister who have thus sustained a second bereavement in so short a time it being only about ten months since their mother died.

The funeral which took place on Friday to the Rocky Saugeen Cemetery was conducted by her pastor Rev. A. Leslie, and in spite of unfavorable weather was very largely attended.—Com.

Artemesia Council

Artemesia Council held its first meeting for 1908 on Monday, Jan 13, pursuant to statute. There were present, Alexander Muir, Reeve; Tho as R. McKenzie, Deputy Reeve; John A. Carson, George F. Wright and Robert Best, Councillors. After each of the above named had duly signed and made the required declarations of qualification and of office before the clerk, they took their seats. The minutes of session of Dec 16 and of special meeting Dec 21, 1907, were read and approved. Communications as follows were read: D. McLeod and C. W. Bellamy, applications for the office of assessor for 1908; R. J. Sproule and Joseph Blackburn, application for the office of auditors for 1908; J. Ross Robertson, asking a grant on behalf of the sick children's hospital.

By-laws were passed appointing C. W. Bellamy as assessor, Joseph Blackburn and R. J. Sproule auditors, and W. J. Caswell, J. P. Ottewill and A. F. Pedlar as the local board of health.

Best—Carson—That John Pedlar be paid for 28 yards of gravel used on road \$1.40. Carried.

Wright—Best—That the following accounts be paid: R. P. Legate, 160 feet of lumber for hub boards, \$2.40; J. & W. Boyd for coal oil, 50c; L. R. Lever, tile as certified by overseer, \$3; W. H. Thurston, election stationery, ballots, etc., \$17.35. Carried.

Best—Wright—That Poter, Muir be paid \$2.50 for removing inmate to house of refuge. Carried.

Carson—McKenzie—That the deputy returning officers and others be paid as follows: Wm McLoughry \$8.50, T. Clayton \$8, W. H. Heard \$8.50, A. Gilchrist \$8.50, D. G. McLean \$8.50, S. Gilbert \$8.50, Geo Malcolm \$8.50, F. H. Thompson \$8.50, and the Clerk for holding nomination and delivering ballot boxes \$8.

McKenzie—Wright—That the Reeve, Mr McLoughry and Mr Carson be paid \$2 each for serving on committee of claim of Thos Douglas and son. Carried.

Wright—Carson—That the Reeve execute quit claims for joyation of road over lot 22 and part of lot 23, con 10, to Geo Chadwick and E. A. Graham, as described in bylaw 674. Carried.

McKenzie—Wright—That the Reeve and Mr Carson be a committee to inquire into the sufficiency of the treasurer's sureties. Carried.

McKenzie—Best—That the Clerk have the insurance on the town hall and furniture renewed in some reliable company to the amount of \$500. Carried.

Carson—Wright—That the Clerk order copies of the Municipal World for 1908 for the use of the members of the Council. Carried.

McKenzie—Wright—That ten dollars be granted in aid of the sick children's hospital and forwarded to J. Ross Robertson, chairman, Toronto. Carried.

McKenzie—Carson—That this Council meet on Saturday, the 8th day of February next, and on the first Saturday of each month during the year except the month of December, which meeting is on the 15th day of December. Carried. Council adjourned.—Advaco.
