During the past four years The Sal- black taffeta ribbon. vation Army has succeeded in bringing to Canada a good class of Farm labourers and Domestic Servants.

Notwithstanding the protest made n some sections of the country, that lot of Veiling in stock. there is a surplus of labour, the Army Officials find there is still a great demand for agricultural labourers and they have found it necessary to charter severai Ocean Liners to supply the need, The call for farm labourers. comes from all parts of the Dominion and now that the Outario Government has decided not to continue supplying farm help, and as it is likely that immigration to Canada will not commence until late in April, the demand for settlers coming out under The Army auspices will be very great. The first chartered ship will be the "Kensingfon, " sailing from Liverpool, Feb. ruary 20th, for British Columbia points, followed by the "Southwak," on March 5th, for Ontario points; the "lonian" from Glasgow, and the . Kensington, " from Liverpool, on
