Misplaced Partizanship.

Mr. Robert Birmingham, "former organizer of the Conservative party," organizer for the Loyal Orange Lodge for Western Ontario, addressed meetings at Varney, Durham and other points recently. Our confreres say he "spoke vigorously" and "incidentally gave some hard knocks to Mr. H. H. Miller."

The members of the Orange Society are for the most part, good, loyal and well-meaning citizens. They are their own best friends. They are associated with good motives, and have as far as we know, an excellent constitution. We believe that the average Orangeman of to-day is a broader minded man than the Orangeman of twenty or thirty years ago, and we do not think that Orangeism as a political party desire that the order should be used for any political purposes. Believing this we think it unfortunate that Mr. Birmingham—a bitter Conservative partizan and former Conservative organizer—should have been chosen as organizer for the Orangemen.

There were Protestants in and out of the Orange order who were alarmed over the school clauses of the autonomy bill, to which Mr. B. referred, but further information—of which Mr. Miller was possessed at the time but of which we were not—showed Government's action in the matter was correct and gave no rights to Catholics, denied to Protestants. This was proved by the manner the people of the west accepted the legislation, and they were the persons most affected. We were frequently told on direct enquiry that there was no bitterness over it, Protestant and Catholic being perfectly satisfied. Besides, Leader Borden of the Conservative party never once mentioned the school clauses at the many meetings held in the two provinces on his recent tour.

In view of all this why should Mr. Birmingham while ostensibly preaching loyalty, endeavor to create a disturbance and feeling of ill-will between Catholics and Protestants in Ontario? Nothing could be more disloyal.

H. H. Miller is a broad minded Canadian citizen, capable of rising above party matters of race and creed and cannot be injured in South Grey by the alleged "hard knocks" of such a well-known partizan as Mr. Birmingham, whose motives and objects are quite transparent.

The Annual Convention.

The event of the year, in the temperance world, so far as the Province of Ontario is concerned, is the Annual Convention of the Ontario Branch of the Dominion Alliance. This convention is the rallying point for all our workers regardless of creed or party and is looked forward to with interest, not only by those who actively sympathize with and take part in it, but by the community at large, for its deliberations are recognized as the consolidated expression of the great mass of temperance electors of this Province.

Especially important attaches to the convention to be held in Toronto on February 25th and 26th next. There will not only be the review of the past year's work, which has been exceedingly heavy, but particular interest centres upon the results of the voting upon Local Option by-laws during the past two years under the new three-fifths requirement.

The Legislature will be in session, and as it is possible it will be the last session before the general Provincial elections, great importance attaches to the representations that will be made to it and the action taken by it in regard to the three-fifths requirement as well as along other lines in connection with temperance work.

Additional attractiveness is given to this year's convention because of the distinguished visitor who will be present in the person of Rev Dr Purley A. Baker, General Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of the United States of America. Dr Baker is at the head and in leader of the great temperance movement now sweeping over the United States, and it has been under his guidance and direction that this movement has had such enormous sweep and secured such magnificent victories, especially in the Southern States.

Power of the Small "Ad."

In a recent issue of one of the McLean Trade Journals, certainly the best of their kind, Mr W. L. Martin writes at length on the above topic: We take space for part of it:

"The question before us is the power of the small business with the small ad. What can advertising do for the small man who has much bigger houses to compete with? How is he to advertise effectively in a small way? These are questions not easy to answer, but in these days of almost universal advertising it's up to every man to answer them in the best way possible, and act up to the answer, for advertise we must.

In advertising there can be no set rule—except Persistency, with a great big P. General advice and general plans are very nearly useless. First of all we must realize that we have to fight a hard fight on a business battle field, where the contestants give no quarter. The idea abroad is for everybody to take all the quarters he can get by hook or by crook, and sometimes by crookedness. The lines on which the smaller advertiser can successfully fight the battle with more formidable rivals must vary according to the field of conflict and the conditions under which the strife is waged, but honesty and persistence must be followed.
