### A New Invention.

Interesting trials are being made in Glasgow with a new type of tramway trolley-head, a New Zealand invention the object of which is to prevent the trolley jumping the wire at curves. The secret of the new trolley-head, says the Glasgow News, is that instead of the wheel being mounted on the rigid spindle in the ordinary fork at the upper end of the pole, it is on a spindle carried on two blocks. These are free to move up and down in two slots slightly inclined downwards toward the rear, with buffer springs behind, which tend to keep the wheel in a straight line with the wire at all irregularities, instead of it having to swivel in the wheel, which is one o the chief causes of the trolley leaving the wire.
