## Taylor & Co., Dromore

### Priceville

Died at his residence in this village, on the 18th inst., Donald McDonald, (big Dan) one of the first residents of the village, coming there over fifty years ago. In religion Mr McDonald was a good member of the Catholic church. For the last year he suffered with that most dreaded disease, cancer, which ended his life as stated. On account of the severity of the weather, the funeral was delayed till Tuesday the 4th inst. His remains were buried in the Pomona R. C. cemetery. Father Walters was unable to attend the funeral obsequies on account of bad roads from Markdale to Pomona.

Mr McDonald was constable for over three years, an office which he filled to satisfaction. He was also the first sawyer in Priceville saw mill, over fifty years ago, when run with the upright saw. There being two Dan McDonalds in Priceville in olden times, the one was called big Dan, the other little Dan, hence the prefix "Big Dan" followed to his grave. Mr McDonald was about 75 years old.

Again the same evening there died with same disease, Arch. McLean, native of the Isle of Tyree, Scotland, at the age of 64 years. On account of the severity of the weather, the body had to be taken to the Presbyterian church, where it remained for five days and nights. The funeral took place on Saturday the 8th inst. and he died on the 1st. Mr McLean suffered much before death came to his relief. He was a long resident of the south line Artemesia, coming there when a boy. At one time he was in fairly good circumstances, but always made a living. His remains were buried in McKinnon cemetery, south line, Artemesia where his father and mother are interred.

We have passed one of the severest winters ever experienced in this part of the county. Wednesday the 5th was a pealer, the east wind blew a terrific gale and it would take more than an ordinary garment to keep one from freezing between the house and barn. The snow is piled up in places to an enormous height. In this town between McArthur's and Mrs Butters' there is snow enough to make good sleighing from here to Bunnassan, and if more were needed we could supply the rest of the road to Durham, from the contents of a ten-foot deep drift between our house and the public highway. It would be a good time for pruners now, as they could prune the trees by standing on the snow drifts, but we hope they will be all away before May.

Mrs Reilly is keeping poorly from the effects of a paralytic stroke she took some time ago.

Mrs McPherson, who spent the last 18 months with her sister, Mrs Black, of Oak River, Man., is at present visiting friends on the south line, Glen elg. Mrs McPherson is none the worse of the thrilling experience she had in the late wreck at Chaplain, while on her way from Manitoba.

No mail from Durham all last week, no trains from Toronto since Tuesday the 4th inst., but probably is up by this time.

Our good Dr. has a large territory to attend to whether it be mild or stormy weather.

We welcome Mr Shirley McIntyre, of your town, as one of our citizens, as he has opened out a large hardware store in the shop owned by the late Arch. Butters.

Our town was on the point of experiencing a famine of bread and flour, during the storm of last week, but relief came and nobody suffered badly.

Rev Mr Matheson went to Swinton Park church the last two Sundays, the most of the way on snow shoes, leaving his horse at Don. McMillan's. He took the rest of the way, taking for his path the nearest route possible through fields and over fences and ditches.

Dr Dixon faced the storm on Wednesday the 6th to Pomona, to attend so John McVicar, who we are sorry to hear, is laid up with typhoid fever. Mrs Bruce, of Calgary, N. W. T. and little boy are visiting at the former's father, Mr John McLaughlin, north line, for the last month, and intend to leave again as soon as possible.

Tuesday the 10th Feb., fine and by the looks of the firmament, we might have a thaw soon, but we are not going to make any predictions as it may turn to an old fashioned Proton thaw some fifty years ago, by having another storm again, but we are told that thaw is gone to the asylum, so we are looking for a more welcomed one in his stead.

The Auditors presented their report which was carefully gone over by Reeve and Council.

Lothian—Ferguson—That the Auditor's Report be adopted, and they be paid \$10 each for their services, and 200 copies be printed for distribution.—Carried.

Lothian—Hunter—That the following accounts be paid: O M Seim, printing \$6.75; W B Sutton, express charges \$0.90; Clerk's registration fees for 67 births, 19 marriages and 27 deaths \$22.60; J. Spicer work on roads with team \$3.00; Geo Ekast do \$5.00; Wm Lonsburg \$1; Reeve telephoning 15c; treasurer—bank exchange, stationery and postage \$3.67.—Carried.

Philip—Lothian—That we adjourn to meet on Thursday, 26th May, as a court of Revision on the Assessment Roll and general business. Carried.
