30 YEARS AGO--A RETROSPECT

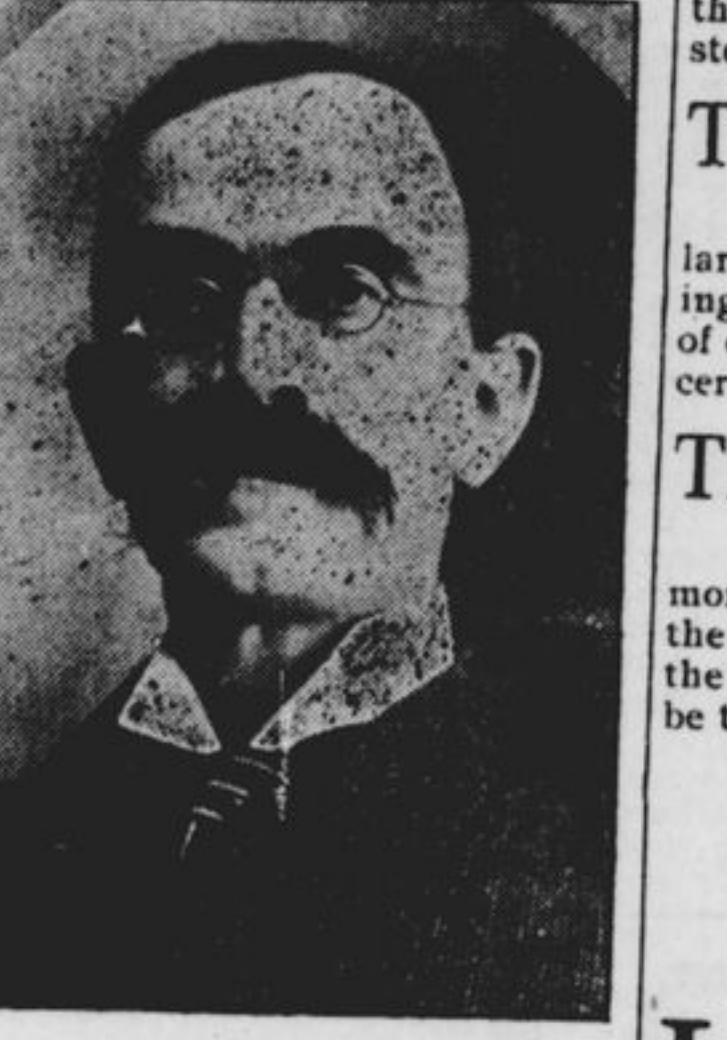
On the 14th of February, 1878, the first number of the REVIEW was issued by Mr. Jos. Townsend, who came to Durham from Dundalk, where he had been running a paper called the "Guide" for one year. Mr. Townsend is still alive and well at Summerside, Ont., where the REVIEW finds him every week.

The REVIEW continued under Jos. Townsend's guidance till October 1884, when his brother Mr. B. H. Townsend took charge and continued in charge till 1891 when he sold out to Mr. C. McArthur, who after 3 1/2 years in the editorial chair sold to the present management, July 1st, 1894.

We have still on our list a number who have taken the REVIEW from the very first issue. We are glad to have them, and hope to have them and the large number who have joined the family since for a long time yet.

At no period in the history of the paper has its standing, circulation and influence been more stable and healthy than at present and we hope that during the next 30 years it will still be found in the very front rank of journals of its class.

Not one, but frequently we have seen the name of H. H. Miller, M. P., mentioned as amongst the available cabinet timber to be drawn upon for the reconstruction of the Ontario section of the cabinet, when that takes place. In the important position of chairman of the Committee on Banking and Commerce to which he was unanimously re-elected this year he has shown ability that marks him plainly as eligible for a cabinet position. In making this assertion we are not simply expressing our own opinion. The last issue of the well-known Insurance Journal "Office and Field," has a splendid half-tone cut of our worthy member, who presides over a group of 128 members, comprising the ablest in parliament containing such names as Laurier, R. L. Borden, Fielding, Foster, Osler, Patterson and many more well-known.

Artemesia Council

The Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia met in the town hall, Flesherton, on Saturday, the 8th day of February, 1908. The members were all present, except Mr. McKenzie, The minutes of last session were read and confirmed.

Communications as follows were presented and read:—Fred Deagle, re road in town; W. J. Lever account for work at Town Hall; Municipal World, acct for assessments; and stationery; County Treasurer, list of lands liable to be sold for taxes in 1908. The Auditor's Report was also presented.

Carson—Best—That the Auditor's report as finally passed by this council be adopted and 150 printed copies be procured.—Carried.

Wright—Carson—That this council are of the opinion that the time has arrived when it is necessary to take active measures to improve the condition of our winter roads and think that the bonding of wire fences would be advantageous in this respect, and further we would invite the public to be present at the next session of this council on the 1st Saturday in March next, between 2 and 3 o'clock p.m. to give the matter consideration and full discussion.—Carried.

Carson—Best—That the account of Chas. Mosier duly certified by local Bd. of Health, \$10.50, for attending on S. Colquett's family whilst under quarantine be paid.—Carried.

Wright—Carson—That W. J. Lever's account \$10.50, for wood for town hall be paid.—Carried.

Carson—Wright—That the account of the Municipal World for Assessment Rolls and forms and stationery, \$15.57 be paid.—Carried.

Wright—Best—That Bloomfield Ferris be paid \$2.65 for work and timber used on bridge at Loxe's mill, as certified by ex-councillor Meads.—Carried.

Carson—Wright—That the following be paid, benz for work on bridge at Loxe's Hill under Mr. Meads; Isaac Sinclair, \$2.63; Robt Wright, \$2.63.—Carried.

Best—Carson—That late Councillor Meads be paid as follows for overseering work on Loxe's bridge two days at \$2.00—\$4.00 and 80c for spikes used.—Carried.

Best—Carson—That Engineer McDowell be paid \$17.30 for services in connection with Collinson ditch and the same be charged to the parties interested.—Carried.
