 Breezy Letter from Port Arthur

We were pleased this week to receive from Mr David McIntyre, Port Arthur, a long letter which we wish we could publish in full just as we did his spy budgets from Bal-sam Valley. But as it is addressed to "Dear friends of the esteemed REVIEW," we reproduce the substance of it:

"I notice by the REVIEW and Toronto Star that you have been having severe storms. Well, here it is just the reverse, though Port Arthur and Fort William have the reputation of being the coldest places in Ontario. Outside of 4 days in January when 36 degrees below zero was recorded, it has been like fall weather down east, wheeling most of the time. The ice breaker is keeping the channel open all the time and it is expected navigation will be open 3 weeks earlier than usual, which means a great deal.

This city has now a population of 13,000, Fort William, about two miles away, about the same. C. P. R. and C. N. R. and also the G. T. R. under construction, enter both places. Our harbor is one of the best on the continent, and heavy consignments of freight are received and shipped from this port. Port Arthur has two elevators and Fort William four, the largest in the world. About 80 cars a day of Western wheat are unloaded here.

Port Arthur is the only city in Canada that owns and operates its own waterworks, its own street railways and other franchises, but this does not keep it from being recognized as a dear town as witness these prices which I vouch for: wheat 80 to 90, barley 40 to 70, oats 50 to 60, potatoes \$1.35 a bag, hay \$14 to \$20, flour \$3.40 a cwt., wood \$4 to \$6, long ard coal \$8 a ton, lumber \$18 to \$45 per M, butter 30 to 35, fresh eggs 50 to 60, stale 26 to 30, rent \$8 to \$40 a month.

"I see you are going to have a dry town soon, not so here, 12 hotels and lots of booze. Times are dull here at present, lots of men out of work. I am still with the C. N. R., a young road but growing fast."

Give Ontario Flour First Place.

Our farmers should back up the millers in their splendid efforts to widen the market for Ontario blended flours and thus educate the whole Canadian people up to the merits of Ontario wheat. The farmer is the one most interested in this work, because he will be most benefited by an increase in the price of his wheat. Yet he is the one who seems to be doing the least to bring about this desired end.

When the slump came in Ontario wheat our millers began to experiment with the various varieties of Canadian grain. They spent thousands of dollars trying to find some combination in which Ontario wheat would be the most important part. It took years of careful and costly research to perfect the blended flours. But the results justified the trouble and expense.

Blended flours, which contain Ontario wheat and a little Western wheat, are better for bread and better for pastry than any other. What our farmers should do—and must do if higher prices for wheat are to be obtained—is to drop Western patent flours and use blended flours instead. If every farmer in Ontario would buy blended flours there would be an enormous demand for these blended flours and a corresponding demand for Ontario wheat. Then the price of Ontario wheat would go up to where it belongs and where it would pay a handsome profit to the farmer.

A Revival in the Swine Industry.

While the swine raising industry has been in some quarters reeling on its ears and in others showing positive retrogression on the live stock branch at Ottawa has been getting out a revision of bulletin No. 10, "The Production of Bacon for the British Market." This booklet in its first edition received such a call that a very large edition became exhausted before the demand was satisfied. The call for copies during the late summer and autumn months fell away to some extent but the renewal of interest and hope in the bacon industry is showing itself very strongly in a request from many quarters of the Dominion for more information upon the question of swine raising. Fortunately the new edition is off the press and ready for distribution.

The bulletin in its revised form will scarcely be recognized. In addition to an almost complete new set of illustrations, which are much better arranged than in the former issue, much new matter has been added. Careful treatment has been given the vital question of housing and in this connection a number of plans of modern, approved pigsties are illustrated and described. The economical utilization of dairy by-products—that margin upon which profit in the industry so much depends—is treated as new matter. The very strong revival of the swine raising industry which must of necessity follow the sacrifice of breeding stock that took place during the past autumn has already commenced to show itself. It is safe to predict that with the return of spring with its pasturage and renewal of supply of dairy by-products, together with the shortage of market stock, a demand for swine greater than has been for many years, will be experienced. To furnish information that will be desired at such a time Bulletin No. 10, revised edition has been prepared.
