A WORD FOR THE PAST.

While giving every credit to the speakers at the Conservative Convention the other day for forceful presentation of their case from a Conservative standpoint, we think their addresses were notable for their omissions.

As to the reduced price of school books from \$1.15 for a set of readers to 49 cts, there appears to have been graft somewhere.

Nor can we believe that the educational interests of the country were neglected under the old administration.

And as we hear of the glories of specialized education at the College, are we never to reflect that the same party now in charge showed at one time bitter opposition to the appointment of a Minister of Agriculture, and in other ways hampered the pioneers in legislative progress while they were laying the foundations of the structure.

Financing in Ontario is at present an easy matter; all the wealth of the new land rolling in and the vast amount received from succession duties, the legislation but only makes it comparatively easy to give increased grants.

We are not carrying at the present Conservative party, on the whole they have done good work, work that was perhaps impossible in the days of one-figure majorities, but it should be shown that the tree now yielding fruit was once a sapling needing diligent cultivation which it duly receives.

HON. A. G. MACKAY.

Last week the new leader of the opposition made his first speech; a leader and his effort has been very generously commended on both sides as being able and judicious.

After a kindly reference to vacant chairs, he denied amid loud liberal applause that members retiring from the Legislature were doing so because of his leadership.

"It would be strange indeed if we did not have a good surplus," he said going on to discuss the finances. He cited the large sums which had flowed into the treasury from the succession duties, the corporation tax, and the tax on brewers and distillers—all of which the Conservative opposition had opposed. In addition the government last year received \$1,600,000 from Cobalt mines, as compared to \$7,000 in 1904.

What Mr. Mackay wanted to know was where the money had gone to.

"I had no particular brief for old governments," he proceeded. "I believe we should do to-day the best we can for to-morrow and for the future. It is a true saying that 'a wise man changes his mind often, a fool never.' Whenever criticism may be justly launched against the old government, I venture to think that when it is judged after the lapse of time, that so far as the administration and legislation is concerned, it will be found to have been well up to mark. (Applause.)"

Mr. Mackay then entered into a lengthy exposition of the Montreal River pulp concession. He went into detail to show that the contract entered into by the late government was better than that entered into by this government, which brought the additional \$300,000. He claimed it would build up Ontario by developing the resources of the north.

Then he turned to law reform, but not in detail. "I regret," he said, "that we may not expect a substantial measure this session for there is no sphere in which reform is more needed. The Speech from the Throne promises a 'scheme' and we have the resolution.

He argued that law reform could not be embodied in the revision of the statutes because certain parts of the constitution depended on the approval of the Dominion and Imperial parliaments. With the object of showing that the resolution did not strike at the root of the evil, he pointed out that at present only about one per cent of cases went to the Privy Council.

He hoped a measure would be introduced later and he advocated the causing out of it as for company judges. More expeditious judgments and more reasonably cheap costs was, he believed, what the people desired in litigation. He was in accord with many of those that were in the resolution and thought the great majority of cases could end in Ontario.

On the education question the Opposition leader was eloquent. He denied the statement that the minimum wage clause providing for the good enforcement of a bad law that the Opposition suggested. Abolition of the model schools meant abolition of the opportunities to the sons and daughters of poor parents. The new system is not producing as good results as the old," he affirmed. "What we need is more subjects, but more thoroughness and more accuracy in the subjects we have. This would do more to equip the young for the real work of life than any veneer of physics, chemistry or anything of that sort.

Then Mr. Mackay made his declaration on the three clause referendum to his doubts as expressed on the government's side. "After the vote of two years ago, repeated again last year," he said, "I don't see any reason to doubt where we stand. We on this side of the House use believe the majority, not the minority rule, should prevail. (Applause.)"

"Some comment is made," he continued, "on the lack of criticism from this side. Our conception of our duty is not to criticize everything adversely, but to accept what is good. I believe the legislation bears distinct impress of improvement from the suggestions of our hon. gentlemen on this side. That is the policy we intend to carry on." (Continued applause.)

"What may, justly be called 'Parliamentary' ton 'colony' took place last week when the Dominion House met for its centennial session, breaking up only because Sunday was in the way. The opposition in their desire to make campaign material set their hearts on something they don't expect to get and so make opportunity for a spectacular display of light implying to the country that some thing is being withheld. At the same time the government may be just a little too contentions. These protracted sessions should be stopped; it is time worse than wasted and the man or party will get honor that advocates an 'christianize' into law an autonomous hour for quitting every day. The present system is a man-killer.
