Dornoch.

The Box Social held in Latona school-house, on Friday evening last, was so brilliant in its nature, that it exceeded our most sanguine anticipations. As it was unanimously conceded on all sides, that from a standpoint of mirth, variety, brilliancy and finance, it eclipsed anything of its kind ever attempted in this vicinity. As the night was an ideal one, the atmosphere being keen and bracing and the silver moon illuminating Nature with an artistic touch of resplendent glory, the commodious schoolroom was soon filled to its utmost capacity, by an intelligent and appreciative audience, the section being well represented and outside points sending a large number of contingents.

The chair was occupied by Dr. J. L. Smith, of Dornoch, who discharged the duties incumbent to such a position in a manner highly creditable to himself and entirely satisfactory to all present.

A notable feature of the evening was the work of the children, who acquitted themselves with honor in their choruses, recitations, solos, etc., their clear articulation, ease of manner and eloquent abilities, reflecting great credit on their teacher, Miss McDonald, whose pains-taking efforts and untiring energy were no doubt responsible for their being so well trained.

But, as previously advertised, the "hit" of the evening was the rendering of the dialogue, "From Pausanias Bridge." In acting the extremely humorous drama, the various participants exhibited talent, whose high standard of excellence was worthy of prominent playwrights, and the hilarious laughter during its progress, and the prolonged applause which followed upon its conclusion, showed that it brought down the house. "The dialogue" "Precarious Precipitation," was a laughable farce, cleverly acted and loudly applauded.

The harmony which characterized the accompaniment executed by Miss Minnie Mitchell, of Williamsford, was the subject of much favorable comment, her statements as a musical expert being recognized by all. She and Miss Legate rendered several duets with an efficiency and depth of pathos seldom surpassed by the prima donnas of leading theatrical companies.

A conspicuous feature of the evening's entertainment was the music by Mr. Pat Malone, who proved himself the genius of the violin, by enrapturing the audience with several selections, which for melody and classical style, were without the higher artists. The instrumental music furnished by Messrs. Draves-Kipp and Nuhn was voluptuously fascinating, the selection being received with enthusiastic applause. Mr. William Lochead's mouth-organ selection were full of sweet melody and he was nearly enraptured.

Messrs. John Clark, James Dargavel and Herman Becker rendered their respective solos in good form, Herman's grotesque con outfit eliciting hearty laughter among the spectators. A pathetic recitation by Mr. Samuel Hamplen, and two humorous ones by Angus Macintosh and Carol Hunt added very materially to the evening's enjoyment.

The music for the male choruses was furnished by Miss McDonald, who presided at the organ with grace and efficiency. One of these selections, "Boys will be Boys" is an exceptionally fine piece of music and was rendered in a manner that elicited hearty approval from the audience. The tableau presented "Tenting on the old camp ground" was one of the hits of the evening. The lights in the building were extinguished and the little group, each with a market in hand, gathered around the "new bit o' log, blinking bonny," was a touching scene, which appealed to the finer instincts of the spectators.

To Mr. John Clark, of Durham, was accorded the honor of announcing the boxes and a superb lot they were, numbering about sixty in all. The boxes, which assumed all varieties of form, such as cradles, eight day clocks, naps and boxes, inserted wigwags, etc., and all sizes from a baby's to a snuff pouch, were a exceedingly beautiful specimens of artistic handiwork and consequently the bidding was keen, brisk and competitive, the quotations ranging in price from \$50 to \$450, and the total proceeds from admission and sale of boxes approximating \$90.00, which breaks the record by a substantial margin.

After the tempting lunches had been disposed of and the craving of the impatient man satiated by the sumptuous delicacies, the crowd dispersed to their respective places of abode, and the "Man in the Moon" smiled benignly and laughed good-humoredly upon many a merry food and happy pair, who were unanimous in declaring that the evening was one long to be remembered on account of the elevated and unrestrained mirth, which characterized and predominated every feature of the night's entertainment.
