### An Explosion at Ottawa.

No small sensation was caused last week in Ottawa by the delivery of Report of the Civil Service Commission. The Report contained but shot for many parts of the service, but was particularly severe on the Department of Marine and Fisheries presided over by Hon. Mr. Brodeur. The Minister very effectively pointed to two instances where the Commissioners had given judgment without being aware of all the facts, thus discounting their criticisms. However there were revelations enough to cause sorrow and Mr. Brodeur manfully gave notice that he would move at once for full investigation into the alleged wrong doings, let the ax-fall where it may. The following from the Montreal Witness sizes up the situation nicely:

Whoever selected Messrs Courtney, Fyche and Bazin as commissioners to investigate the civil service had certainly no desire for anything but an utterly frank, trenchant, and energetic revelation, and no one who has had anything to do with our public business had the least doubt that such investigation would result from the position taken by Mr. Brodeur, whose department was singled out by the report for special animadversion in not the least possible investigation. The country would like to see this commission rendered permanent until there is at Ottawa a new heaven and a new earth. The commission goes so far as to say that conditions have got worse of late years. Certainly we should be grateful to the government that has accepted the question so uncompromisingly and that now demands further investigation. It is time to do something great in the way of a revolutionary reform.
