Graham, but it is under consideration. Then there will be the candidates elect, (if any) and altogether it will be a bad place to stay away from. The regular meeting was held on Monday night. All present, but Councilor Robertson, who was called away by sickness. There was the usual grist of accounts, which were passed as below: one of J. P. Telford's, another of McGrath & McAniff's, being held for further consideration. Also acts of C. Layelle and Constable Carson were before special Examiner were held over.

The Town Council Dead-LOCK.

How long is the town to sit quietly by and see its interests sacrificed by contentious councils? Is it not time that a move should be made to put an end to the bickering that occur, resulting in nothing being done on important questions while other business is neglected? See Council minutes elsewhere. As to Armory site.--We have Saunders, Kinnee, Sharp, Robertson on one side; Brown, Calder, Kress, McGowan on other. A tie vote such as this indicates means nothing unless the mayor votes again to break the tie, which is an irritating proceeding even if it can be justified, which we doubt. There are two courses open to us believe to the people: (1) either vote or (2) let the Mayor and Council resign in a body, and see if the town can elect a new set of rulers that will work harmoniously. Now let's see who are willing to adopt this last heroic method.

31st Not to be Overlooked.

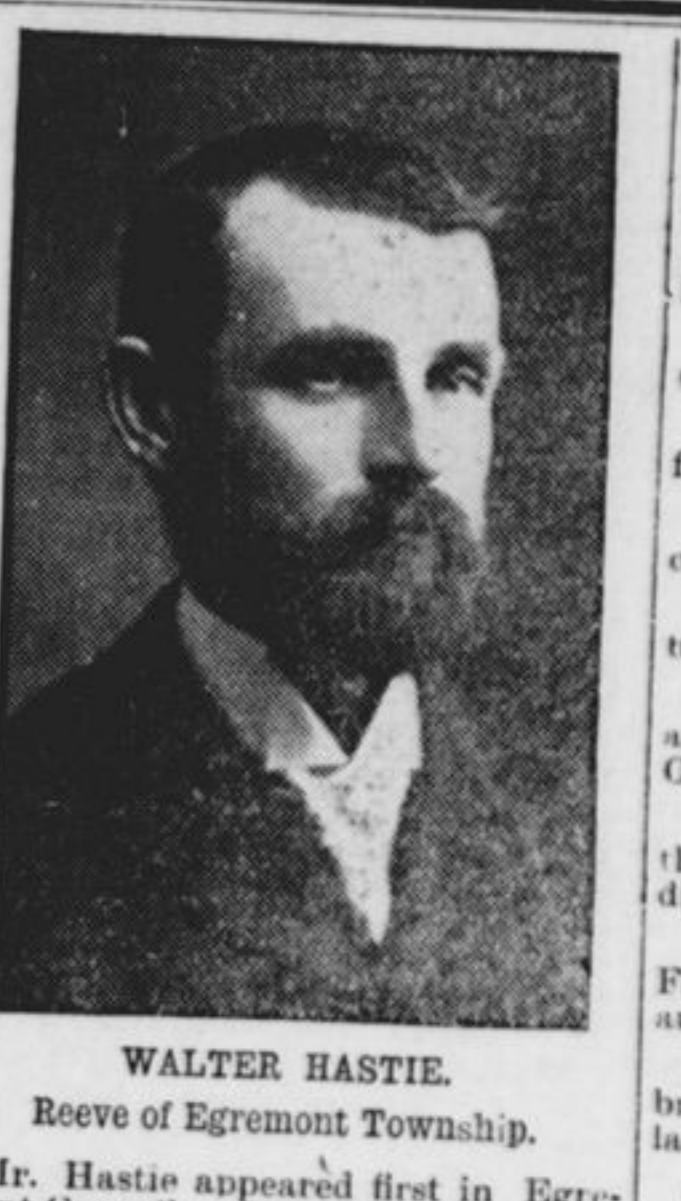
The following extract from a letter of the Minister of Militia to Mr. H. H. Miller M. P. gives hope of the 31st going to Quebec. The letter was in Mr. R. Torry's possession: "Doubtless, to some extent, the selection will depend upon fitness, as otherwise, it is desirable as far as possible to have all sections of the country represented and it is probable the selections will be made from all eligible units in Eastern Canada. I think you may be quite sure that the 31st Regiment will not be overlooked."

The Toronto Horse Show.

The Fourteenth Canadian Horse Show to be held in the St. Lawrence Arena Toronto on April 29th, 30th, May 1st, and 2nd, promises to outline in numbers and quality of horses all its predecessors. A very notable saddle horse which has swept the ring in New York will be shown in May morning formerly the property of the late J. W. Harriman. This mare was purchased recently by Miss Eva Brown for a rink on the northern portion of the school grounds, and which can be secured for \$100. However no amendment was moved but instead an enquiry by Councilor Kinnee if the Mayor intended to push this question to a vote that night with an empty seat at the table. On being assured that he was, he as well as Reeve Saunders made strong protest, the Mayor had promised not to deal with it except at a full board, said they, which the mayor denies, and rather than risk defeat and before the motion could be put both left the table, followed by Councilor Sharp, and the council was without a quorum!
