POISONED CANDIES.

Woman on Trial For Causing the Death of a Young Girl.

Kansas City, April 6.—Arguments in the case of Mrs. Sarah Morasch, charged with the murder of four-year-old Ruth Miller, were begun in the circuit court today at Kansas City, Kan. It is expected the case will go to the jury to-night. Mrs. Morasch is charged with sending poisoned candies to the Miller girl's sister, one of which was partaken of by Ruth, who died a few hours later.

FIREMAN KILLS SELF.

Anthony Haas Cuts Throat in Doctor's Office.

Detroit, April 6.—Driven to despair by real and imaginary troubles, Anthony Haas, a city fireman, 51 years old and living at 939 Melrose avenue, committed suicide by cutting his throat in the office of Dr. Ingalls, 351 1/2 Michigan street, yesterday morning. Haas seized an opportunity when Dr. Ingalls' back was turned, the two being alone in an inner office, and the first instant that the doctor received was when he turned to see Hans jamming at his throat, a knife in his hand. Dr. Ingalls made a desperate effort to prevent the suicide, but he struggled with the crazed man in vain. When he was freed Haas fell to the floor the latter was almost dead.

BURIED UNDER SALT VAT.

Body of Unknown Italian Discovered at Syracuse.

Syracuse, April 6.—Examination of a body of an unknown Italian found buried in a salt vat yesterday revealed wounds which indicate the man died of violence. The body was found in a bag and buried in a hole a foot deep under the salt vat. The brine had permeated the corpse and fairly preserved it. Two Italians are in custody as suspects of the crime. The police believe that they have discovered the identity of the dead man, but has been unable thus far to obtain corroboration by Italians.

COINS FROM NEW MINT.

First Shipment Made to Various Parts of Country.

Ottawa despatch: The first shipment of silver coin was made from the Canadian Royal Mint yesterday afternoon, a total of \$24,000,000 being sent to various parts of the country. The coins were of all denominations, and the proportion was so far as value was concerned, of each class was sent out. There were 12,000 50-cent pieces, 24,000 25-cent pieces, 60,000 10-cent pieces and 120,000 5-cent pieces, making \$6,000,000 worth of each denomination. The money was shipped to the Receiver-General in Toronto, Montreal, Vancouver and other cities, who will be distributing it as they are applied for.

STUDENTS ON STRIKE.

No Attendance at Lectures in New York University.

New York, April 6.—The entire student body of New York University went on strike today and refused to attend their recitations, to take a protest against the suspension of Alfred Young, President of the junior class, Young's suspension was the result of the hazarding of Henry Bloch, a freshman who was ducked in the campus fountain yesterday. Bloch had been unpopular, and it is said that some of the students have asked his father to take him out of the university.

GOULDS PREPARE TO AVERT BREACH.

TEMPEST OVER THE PRINCE'S WEDDING SUBSIDING.

Conciliation in View—Nobleman Declares Reports He is Disappointed Are False, and Denies He is a Fortune Hunter.

New York, April 6.—Evidence was forthcoming last night that efforts now are being made to check the family breach occasioned by Mme. Anna Gould's avowed determination to accept the hand of the Prince Heli de Sagan. The Prince, who had stated that Mme. Gould had taken legal steps to protect her interest in the estate of her father, after he had died, had stated that she had not done so, and that she had no intention of doing so.

SUES FOR DIVORCE.

Mrs. Vanderbilt Wants Absolute Decree.

New York, April 6.—Within an hour after he had sailed for Europe to-day Alfred Guyne Vanderbilt was told by the defendant in a suit filed with the Supreme Court by his wife, Ellen French Vanderbilt, who seeks an absolute divorce. Justice O'Gorman, before whom the proceedings were instituted, appointed David McClure, a local attorney, as referee to hear testimony and to report findings and recommendations to the court. Mr. McClure said his appointment in the case was a big surprise to him.

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GOLD RESERVE INADEQUATE.

British Financier Predicts Trouble in Case of War.

London, April 6.—Sir Robert Giffen, addressing the Royal United Service Institution, gave a new form to the question of the gold reserve in the form of a vision of the calamities that an outbreak of a war with a first-class power would bring upon Great Britain, such as a breakdown of the credit system, ruin of mechanics and bankers, and a run for cash on all sides in a general panic. Sir Robert then proceeded to urge the necessity of a greatly increased gold reserve, as a war chest, in order to avoid resort to inconvertible paper. He estimated the liabilities of the banking system at £300,000,000. The gold reserve is £200,000,000, of which £40,000,000 is in the Bank of England, plus money held in Scotland and Ireland against note issues.

MAN SUES FICKLE GIRL.

Would-be Bridegroom Wants \$5,000 Balm for Wounded Heart.

Lancaster, Pa., April 6.—For the first time in the history of the county a jilted would-be bridegroom has sought the courts for damages to his wounded feelings. F. W. Ream, 42 years old, is the plaintiff, and he asks for \$5,000 damages from Beatrice Vallock, 23 years old. In the affidavit filed he sets forth that he courted Beatrice for five years. They were engaged to be married about two years ago. Nothing unusual occurred in their courtship until January, 1908, when she told him she had decided to use a woman's prerogative to change her mind. Ream says he will press the suit to an early trial for the benefit of other men who may be similarly jilted.

FEAR THE LICENSE LINE.

Buffalo Brides Prefer to be Married in Ontario.

Buffalo, April 6.—Since the new marriage law requiring license went into effect in Buffalo the records have shown a marked decrease in the number of marriages here as compared with the corresponding months in other years. It has become known that many of the brides-to-be are being married in Ontario, and that many Canadian points simply because the brides-elect have refused to go through the ordeal of courtship at all. FAILED TO PAY HEAD TAX.

The Canadian immigration officers did not detect the nationality of the three stylishly dressed Celestials and failed to stop them and collect the \$500 head tax. The conductor reported them to the police who turned them back. The trio claimed that they were on a trip around the world, and spoke the English language fairly well.

JILTED BY HIS GIRL.

Hanged Himself and Left Her Money for Musicians.

New York, April 6.—"If you want to know why I did it, come around to my grave in the Harvard Road Cemetery on Christmas and I'll tell you all about it. It's none of your business but I'm willing to satisfy your curiosity. You will find enough money in my pockets to pay the funeral expenses and buy a keg of beer for the musicians." Benesh, twenty-six, 3441 East Fifth street, hanged himself from the door of his room because he was jilted by the girl he loved.

A COWARDLY FALSEHOOD.

London, April 6.—Chief Secretary for Ireland Augustine Birrell in the House of Commons this afternoon publicly denied the rumor which has been current in Dublin and other parts of Ireland connecting the name of Lord Haddo, the eldest son of the Earl of Aberdeen, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, with the theft of a portion of the State regalia, valued at \$250,000, from Dublin Castle last summer. It has been suggested that this was the Government's reason for its refusal to grant a public inquiry into the affair.

SANKEY'S SON HAS PAREISIS.

Daughter-in-Law Asks Court For Guardianship Over Husband.

New York, April 6.—Mrs. John E. Sankey, wife of the eldest son of Ira D. Sankey, the singing evangelist, today applied to Justice Hendrick, of the Supreme Court, to be appointed guardian for her husband, who is in Rivercrest Asylum in Astoria. In her petition Mrs. Sankey cites the affidavit of the physician in charge of the sanitarium, which described Sankey as having a hallucination that he is the greatest man living and also the creator of the world. Sankey is suffering from paresis. His father, now well into the seventies, lives in Brooklyn, paralyzed and blind.

CANADIAN SEALER SEIZED.

Montevideo, Uruguay, via Galveston, Texas, April 6.—Senator Baehni, Minister of Foreign Affairs, who has been interviewed, declares that Great Britain has only protested against the accord of 1889 between Uruguay, Argentina, Brazil, Peru, Chili, Paraguay and Bolivia extending the open sea jurisdiction five miles from shore. The protest is caused by the capture of the Canadian sealer Agnes Danaher, but only extended to the open sea, while it upholds jurisdiction over half the River Plate, the other half belonging to Argentina.
