### Finances of Ontario.

Even the most enthusiastic support-ers of the present Ontario Government cannot claim that a reg .rd for economy in the handling of the public tunds has been the strong point in the record made by the Whitney Admin-

The total expenditure of the Province in 1903 was considerably less than \$5,000,000. The ordinary expenditure last year, as appears by page a 103 of the Public Accounts, was \$7,714,400, The appropriations for 1903 call for practically the even \$8,000,000. Thus the increase in outgo in the five years is roughly 60 per cent, as against an increase of 38 per cent, in the expenditure of the Dominion Government during the five years ending with 1907.

Coupled with the increase in expenditure there has been an addition to the Provincial indebtedness. 1904 the debt incurred on account of railway and annuity certificates, and the building of the Temiskaming road, totalled less than ten million dollars. In 1907 the debt on the same account was over fifteen and one-half millions, and an entirely new obligation of \$530,000 had been created to provide for an annuity of \$30,000 a year to Toronto University.

Furthermore the accounts are kept in such a manner that tull details of the expenditure and debt are not clearly shown. When the late Government was in power the salaries of the several Ministers were voted openly year after year. The sum of \$7,000 was placed in the estimates for the Premier, and \$4,000 for the other members of the Government. Under the present Administration with a salary of \$9,000 for the Premier and \$6,000 for the other members the sev eral amounts do not appear in the estimates of all. The excuse given for failing te place these in the estimates is that when the increased salaries were voted a statute was passed au-thorizing same, and that under these circumstances the amount does not require to be voted year by year. der the new the University received last year nearly \$332,000, but not last year nearly \$332,000, but not one dollar of this appeared in the estimates of the year, this outlay also being recorded in bulk as paid under special statute.
