MUNICIPAL TROUBLES.—Meaford asked for tenders for a new Town Hall and got 31 of them the highest over \$20,000, the lowest about \$25,000 while the sum voted by the ratepayers was only \$15,000. 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The Armory May be Lost.

Council will not accept the Government choice of site.

In a season when building operations are going to be none too brisk, it is disheartening indeed to find a rejection of our council so heedless of the town's welfare as to give unreasoning and unreasonable opposition to the project of receiving from the government the gift of an armory.

Councillor Kinnee and those with him are glorifying Calder too much by ascribing to him power to influence even the Dominion government in selecting a site. To the charges and innuendoes that undue influence has been used, but it is plain these are not accepted in good faith, or a cordial and unanimous acceptance would have been made of the decision of Col. Galloway.

We have no brief to champion Calder, he makes mistakes. We have frequently differed from him, but surely it is the acme of folly to stand in fear of action because acquiescing would put them on the same side as Calder.

Why the Mayor, Did he hypnotize them? Was it charged that the election was crooked? Are there not seven men at the table to watch this? It is certain that were he to resign the Mayorality as a test and run again the town would again elect him. Why, then, should a faction of the council be so infatuated as to stand in the plain path of progress?

The best sentiment of the town appeals to the council to get together, to cast aside suspicion, and they will find in what appears to be a foe, a friend, trying to get the rate down to 30 mills!!
