PERSONAL MENTION

A statement was read from Treas Jackson, showing in a lucid manner, that the town's finances were running low a sum of \$414.55 being still to their credit. Certain obligations were coming due soon, but there were also certain payments expected from Furniture Co. and other sources.

Accounts were passed as follows: Clerk's salary for April 30 00 Clerk cutting wood and Ptce. 82 G. Ryan, 1/2 cd of wood 1.75 R. Alfie, ironing whippetree 75 Jas. Irwin, P. G. acct. 10.50 Mrs. Jas. Lavigne Witness fees 1.50 Alex Duncan Witness fees 1.50 Neull Falkingham 75 Dan McGrath services as constable 1.50 C. Lang, drawing gravel 2.00 Assessor Elvidge was given \$80.00 on acct.

A letter was read from Solicitor W. F. Dunn, on behalf of Miss McDonaId asking for a grant of \$100 or \$150 on behalf of his client for injuries received on the hill last winter, by being run into by boys coasting. The mayor, who is sympathetic, disclaimed responsibility for the town. The offending boys he believed, were known and recourse should be taken against them. After discussion as to their liability under their by-law, the matter was sent to the town solicitor.

Chief Terry of the Fire Brigade asked, by letter, for an increase of salary. The request was granted. Fire and Light committee.

The long standing unsettled account with Jno. Clark, re street watering was advanced a stage. Mr. Clark admitted the validity of various claims made against his bill. \$25.00 was retained by the council until full settlement was made, the balance to be paid pro rata to the claimants.

Councillor Brown brought up the armory question once more, and requested since he and Com. Sharp had been absent at last meeting to have the correspondence read again. This was done, the mayor detailing in order the various steps that had been taken till the final letter came from Lt.-Col. Rorke, announcing that the government had made choice of the Garafraxa street site.

The talk that followed could scarce be called discussion, so that the "chewing" being applicable to what took place on both sides. Mr. Wm. Edge, on behalf of the Edge Estate, was present and stated the terms, already well-known, by which the town would get the armory site. These terms are that the town pay for the conveying and grade a street from Garafraxa to Albert St., though no injunction was put upon them to do it right away. Simply register it as a street of the town. Reeve Saunders thought they were to get a free deed of the whole forgetting that that offer was conditioned on securing the property on RICK St. as the mayor pointed out.

Mr. Brown finally moved, seconded by Mr. McGowan that the mayor be instructed to have a deed drawn out in favor of the King, so that it could be transmitted to the proper authorities and have construction begun at once. On a show of hands the mayor declared it carried 4 to 3. Mr. Robert, who was called for resulting in the same impasse that has made progress impossible during the past few months. Here it is:

Yes Brown Kinnee
No Calder Robertson
Kress Saunders
McGowan Sharp.

The mayor promptly declared the motion lost and intimated his intention never to bring the matter up again placing the responsibility of the loss of the armory on those who will not support it. The vote was 4 to 3. He rejected the choice made by the government, which as one of the letters said "would be final," "with out fear or favor." This brought Mr. Kinnee to his feet, declaring the responsibility for the loss of the armory fell on the mayor, because (if we understood him right) he, the mayor had the privilege of voting, but not the right to carry it. The vote was so, &c. This brought up the usually impassable mayor who unloaded on Mr. Kinnee a piece of his mind.

The meeting was nearly bursting up, the situation being so bad, that the fruitless, when Councillor Sharp saved the situation by remarking that though he had voted Nay, as he had a right to do, rather than see the town lose the armory he would change his vote. The mayor put it to the council if they desired a revote, not a reconsideration, and the desire for a revote was carried by 5 to 3. The revote was taken by again recording the yeas and nays carrying Mr. Brown's motion for action by 3 to 3.

This we think should be accepted by all parties in good faith. The fight was a strenuous one, but there should have been no fight at all when the unbiased Col. Galloway had made his decision. Already time has been lost. By this time the contract might have been let and levelling in progress.

Hurry up the deeds in favor of the King, who will be a proud man when he owns an armory in Durham—not forgetting H. H. Miller and Ben Sharp, the latter gentleman for breaking a resolution that was "more honored in the breach than in the observance." The town won't forget him.
