NEW BANK OPENED.--On Saturday morning last the Traders Bank opened the branch here as we announced last week. Mr. J. C. Telford is again in charge, with two assistants.

NEW BANKING HOURS.--An agreement has been arrived at between the Standard and Traders Banks here which the public will appreciate. The Saturday half holiday is cut out and taken on Friday, when the banks will close at 1 p. m. Closing hour Saturday, 4 p. m. The other four days of the week at 3.30 p. m. This is an extension of three banking hours in the week, quite a boon but the Saturday afternoon open bank has been long desired. Thanks.

ALBERTA SCHOOLS.--We are in receipt of the first Annual Report of the Department of Education of the Prov. of Alberta, sent by our good friend Insp. Thibaudeau, of Lacombe. It is a well- gotten up volume of over 200 pages showing wonderful growth and advancement in educational ideas. There are now about 800 school districts with only 7 Separate Schools reported. In 1906 the average salary paid to all teachers employed was \$914.13. Amongst the Inspectors we notice also the name of J. W. Brown formerly of Hanover.

EXTENSION TO REGISTRY OFFICE.--Saturday last Messrs. McDonald, Hastie, Schenk and Saunders, the Co. Council committee in charge of the addition to South Grey Registry office met here and opened the tenders. The tender of Mr. Prast, of Hanover, was accepted the figures being \$2181. Mr. Kustadt, of town is to do the plumbing, excavating, &c., for \$174. The tender of Mr. Hugh McDonald was we believe, only \$2 above Mr. Prast's, and if this is correct it strikes us that, for so slight a difference, it would have been a graceful thing to have given it to a Durham man. No County council, however exacting, would have blamed them. The building is to be 20x28 feet, stone basement, brick walls, iron truss roof, steel beams and with every known precaution against fire. The new part will be entirely for the clerks, giving more space to the public in front.

THE NEW BRIDGE.--Citizens are asking "What about the bridge on Garafraza St?" We had the pleasure of seeing the plans, cost we believe \$75,000, in the clerk's office and certainly they are elaborate and present a bridge and its approaches worthy of our good town and the important position it occupies in it. The arch over the stream is to be of reinforced concrete, a modern system of uniting steel and cement greatly superior to either article alone. But the trouble lies in the financing. A By-law granting \$4000 for the purpose is all that is available, while the tenders are almost certain to be more than that sum. However there is a keen competition we believe and we hope the town may succeed in getting a good bridge for a reasonable sum.

GREAT WIN FOR TEMPERANCE.--The city of Fredericton adopted the Scott Act 30 years ago and four times has the liquor party been defeated in attempt to repeal it. The fourth attempt took place week before last, a larger vote was polled than at political elections, yet the majority, 178, is nearly three times as large as the largest of the three previous contests. Slowly but surely men are coming to see that the bar is no part of our business life.

A MODERN BLUEBEARD.--Shocking is the story from Laporte, Ind., of a series of murders committed by a Mrs. Guinness, who, by a matrimonial advertisement, describing herself as a "comely widow," lured wealthy suitors to her home, from which they never returned. The clue was found a few weeks ago when her house was burned down, and she with her three children burned to death. Later it is being suspected "she" is still alive and that the headless trunk of a woman in the ruins was another victim. In her farm near by, the dismembered bodies of a dozen victims have been dug up.

BETTER MAIL SERVICE.--Just lately an improved mail service has been inaugurated between Durham and Holstein and Mt. Forest. Way-bags now go to and come from these places on night trains, in addition to the regular mails. Glascock has now got three mails weekly instead of two. Lauriston P. O. has been re-opened in East Glenelg, and Markdale has been made a customs collecting office. All largely owing to the interest and efforts of our worthy member, H. H. Miller, M. She was born in Armagh Co., Ireland and came to this country 50 years ago and for most of that time lived with her nephew the late Alex. Beggs. For the past four years she has been assiduously cared for by Mrs. Beggs being totally blind for that time. Her removal in her helplessness was a happy relief. She was buried on the 9th inst in Saugeen cemetery.

MOVING THE MILL.--Messrs Filabie & Walker, Mt. Forest, have purchased a large timber bush near Duncan, Euphrasia Tp., and have engaged Mr. Robt. Smith of town, with his portable saw-mill, to cut the timber. With Mr. Wm. Clark of Varney, he is leaving this week to commence operations and will spend the summer there at least. Both Mr. Smith and Mr. Clark intend moving their families in the near future to reside while engaged there.

RIOT IN OWEN SOUND.--Monday morning last there was a bloody conflict between striking Dock hands, and a posse of 50 special constables brought by the C. P. R. from Toronto. The constables, as they interfered to order men from the C. P. R. property, were attacked and some one used a revolver, a signal for a general mix-up of revolvers, batons and impps of coal, and ten minutes of serious strife. The mayor read the riot act, and the local constables are getting credit for stopping the melee which collapsed suddenly and without loss of life, though a score or more were injured by missiles and batons and at least five received bullets. The men's demands as to wage have been met and all is peace.

HONORS FOR DURHAM BOYS.--In the results of the Examinations of the Faculty of Applied Science of the University of Toronto, published to-day, Mr. Lylal G. Ireland has passed his four year exams, taking the degree of B. A. Sc. with honors. Mr. Keith Newton has also passed his first year exams. In Mining Engineering with honors. Congratulations to both.

DEED DRAWN.--The deed for the Armoury site has been conveyed we believe from the Edge Estate to the town. The location is on the level spot north of the Hughes property, the new street, to be registered as a street of the town running between the armory and the market series. We hope the government will now use all expedition in setting things a-going, though really it does not become the town to be urging haste.

OFFICIAL INFORMATION.--The Walkerton and Lucknow Railway, which has been under construction for a couple of years from Proton, on the Toronto-Owen Sound line, to Walkerton, Ont., is reported to be practically completed. A spur line has been graded from Hanover to Braut, for convenience of the Durham Cement Co. Surveyors have been looking over the ground recently with a view, it is said, of locating a line from Hanover to Southampton, via Elmwood, Chesley, Paisley and Port Egin.-- Railway World.

Gifted with splendid descriptive powers and an excellent memory, Mr. Kearns in simple, direct style, touched on all countries visited and any characteristics of countries and inhabitants, but his opinion was not in any degree lessened, rather strengthened, that Canada was the best land under the sun; the land of greatest freedom, brightest opportunities and highest morals. In their 5 mos. trip, they travelled 30,000 miles, spent 60 days on water, and touched every continent but South America. Before and after the address, some of Durham's budding vocalists, Misses Dawkins, Everett, A. Linin and Mr. F. Benton favored the audience with fine solos, the Reid brothers, W. K. and Thos. with a duett, which was heartily encored, and Mrs. Sproat with a recitation. Miss Rita Irwin made an efficient accompanist. Moir, the Murderer, Captured

After a chase of over two weeks, which was not all on his tracks however, Moir was captured on a farm near Arthur. He had engaged as a farm hand, and was giving satisfaction, though his employer was a little curious about his antecedents. Working near the highway a stage driver noticed him day by day and was struck with his likeness to published photos. He quietly told what he saw, and the police and detectives very cleverly did the rest.

Posing as horse buyers the two detectives entered the stable with the farmer and edging nearer to the unsuspecting Moir they seized him and at once he divined their purpose. He struggled with them for nearly 10 minutes, trying to get his hands on a revolver he carried, but he failed or there might have been another fatality; for five of the six chambers were loaded. He gave up, exhausted, and was handcuffed and in due time was taken to London where the crime was committed.

It will be remembered he shot to death, Lloyd, his superior officer, who was reprimanding him for drunkenness and insubordinate conduct, and fled. He got rid of his regimentals somehow, and begged a living till he reached Eora where he engaged with the farmer.

This is another of the fruits of the liquor traffic. He blames his calamity on the drink which has blotted out one life and may two.
