Obituary. DUNCAN MCGILLIVRAY.

The following from a North Dakota paper will be read with sorrow by friends and relatives here. Deceased was a son of Mr. Malcolm McGillivray, formerly of Bentinck. MCGILLIVRAY.—At his residence in Bathgate township on Saturday, April 23rd, 1908, Duncan McGillivray aged 40 years, of blood poisoning. The funeral services were held at the Baptist church on Monday the 27th inst. Rev. Start officiating and interment was made in the Bathgate cemetery. The pall bearers were D. McIntosh, J. Anderson, J. Thomson, W. Edgington, T. Carrick, A. Beaton. The attendance to pay last respects to Duncan was very large considering the almost impassable condition of the roads. Friends from Hamilton, Cavalier, Neche, and other neighboring towns were in attendance and heart-felt were the expressions of sympathy. Mr McGillivray was born in Bentinck township, Grey Co., Ont., in 1868 and removed with his parents to this country in 1878 and resided with them until a few years ago when he moved to his present place of residence and took up farming for himself. His illness was of only a few days duration and he passed almost immediately from a state of robust health, being one of the finest specimens of physical manhood in the county. He was of a retiring disposition and popular with all who knew him; a kind and loving son and brother, an honourable and obliging neighbor. The community was deeply stirred by his untimely ending and the mourning father and brothers and sisters have the sympathy of all.

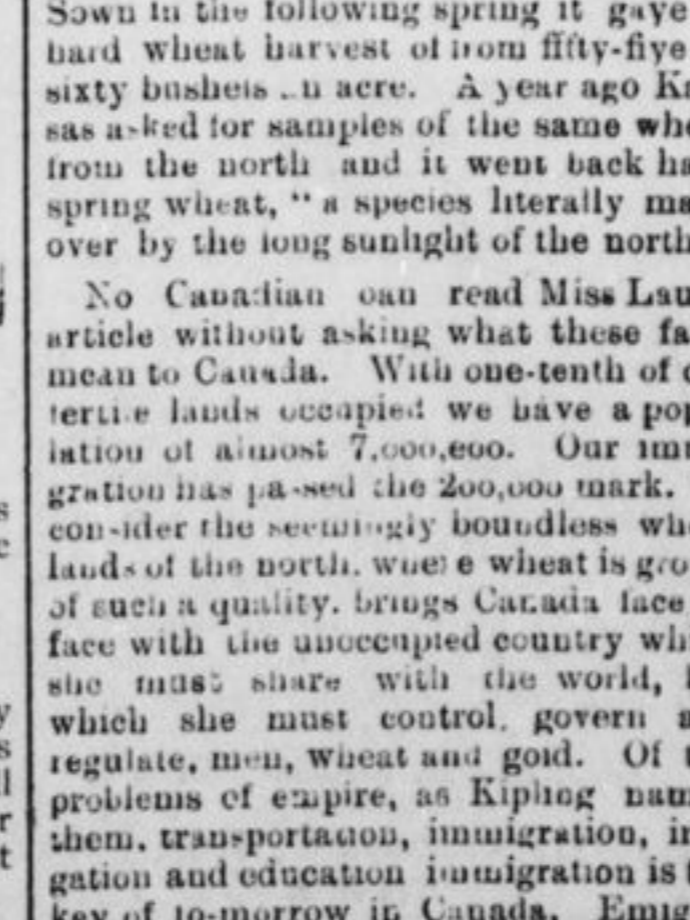

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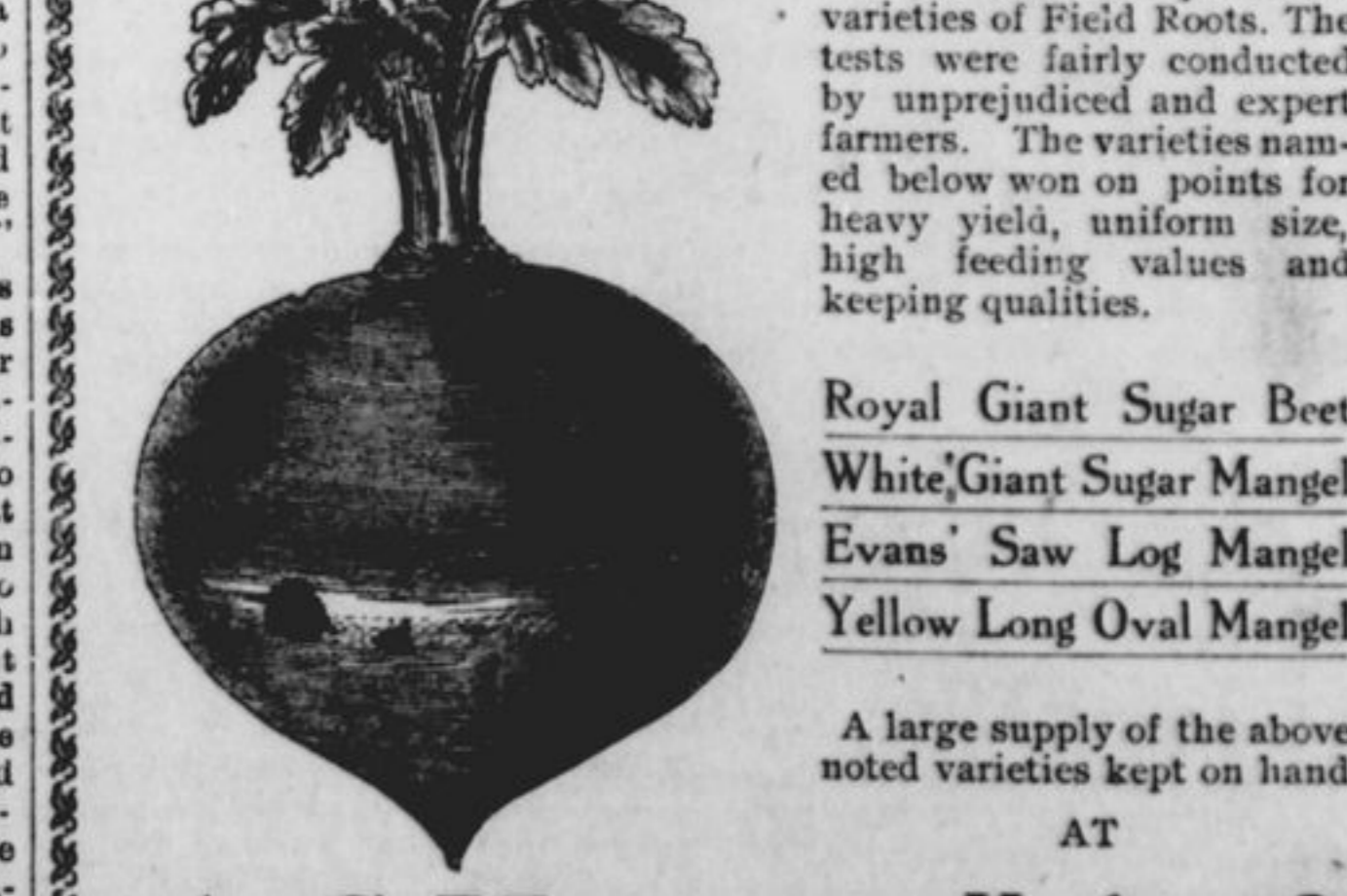
