**10 Reasons Why Voters Should Vote For Neil McCannel.**

1. Because he is a farmer with the inclination and the intention of devoting himself to his parliamentary duties, rendering a worthy service to all the electorate.
2. Because as a farmer, knowing farming conditions, he condemns the extravagance that has in 3 years increased the expenditure per capita as much as in the preceding 33 years, this increase being largely in departments that do not benefit the farmer.
3. Because Mr. Whitney, though receiving an enormous majority, yielded to the spoilsmen, almost a clean sweep being made of the License Inspectors and in the last days of the session gave grants and guarantees into the millions.
4. Because Mr. Whitney broke his own promises as to giving a measure of Law reform, ending the session with another promise, which may also be broken.
5. Because of the muddling they made of School legislation almost taking all power out of Trustees' hands, until the indignation of the public and pressure of the opposition compelled them to withdraw it. Besides, their vacillating policy as to Model Schools is not in the interest of the poor man.
6. Because the Conservative treatment of Northern Ontario has led to a dangerous secession movement.
7. Because the government bungling and procrastination on the power question resulted in losing for the Province the valuable asset of Niagara power.
8. Because of the government's lack of trust in the people that gave them their big majority, as shown by the unnecessary Redistribution Act and the manifest intention shown therein to increase the Conservative chances, especially in Toronto.
9. Because Dr. Jamieson when in opposition, wanted the number of members reduced to 60, wanted the boundaries of constituencies to be fixed by judges, and redistribution only after a census, yet a few weeks ago he voted to increase the members to 110, to have a redistribution, even when there was no census, and that a committee of 5 Conservatives and 3 Liberals should change the Constituencies.

10. Because Dr. Jamieson owing to his many cement and other interests cannot give and has not given the efficient service South Grey deserves and requires.

—Mr P. McCallough, Barrister, of Markdale, is opposing Mr Lucas in Centre Grey as the candidate of the Reform party. Pat, as his friends call him, is a fighter, is popular, and his courage is shown by entering this contest, the riding being generally the other way. He won't be found coming a few minutes late on Nomination Day, and may make it interesting for his opponent.

—Mr Lucas has been again nominated for Centre Grey and at the nomination devoted his whole time to the temperance Legislation of the government. He says they are not bound to stick to the three-fifths clause, and he promises, if elected, to introduce a bill to repeal it, whether the government are willing or not. But in effect he says that he won't support repeal if Mackay or his followers move it. Must have all the glory or no repeal. Great statesman!

Dr Godfrey who has been renominated as conservative candidate in West York, delivered a speech at his nomination that is out of the ordinary run of political harangues and appeals to us as having the statesmanlike ring about it. He said in part: "Last year there were 3,000 deaths from consumption in this Province, that number 75 per cent might have been cured. Consumption is not an incurable disease, it is not hereditary. Some people have a predisposition to it, but there is nothing hereditary about it. At present you can't get a free patient into the sanitarium at Gravenhurst. They haven't room. To get proper attention and to be removed from contact with people to whom he may impart the germs, a sick man must pay from \$12 per week upwards. Few can afford that, and I am going to ask the Government to take steps to help its own people against the white plague. Every man is worth \$1,500 to the State; it has been estimated that to care for and bury one patient is \$368; and to give the patient treatment which in the early cases would save his life and a citizen to the state would cost only \$350. The highest kind of politics is not parties. I intend, gentlemen, to work for the lives of our citizens, and if possible to obtain the support not alone of my own party but of those men on the opposite side as well."—Enterprise

**Rev. D. C. Hossack on Whitney Rule.**

Continued from last week.

**Law Reform.**

At a meeting held December 22nd, 1904, Mr Whitney expressed his views on law reform. The Mail and Empire gives the following report of his remarks:—"A few years ago the Conservative party declared its policy on several questions. It favored law reform. The Divisional Court was an anomaly. The expenses had been lessened and the results of litigation lessened. There should be one final Court of Appeal for the Province, and one only. If matters continued as at present, it would soon come about that no man but the rich could go to law and get his rights in Ontario."

The first term of the Government has passed. They have been in office nearly four years, and nothing has been done for law reform. There is need of relief; the Government have failed to give it. There has been a conspicuous failure and the people are disappointed.

**The Three-fifths Clause.**

When the Government passed the three-fifths clause of the local option act they were guilty of reactionary legislation. Ever since Ontario became a province the majority in a municipality has had the right to decide upon the granting of licenses. These rights were firmly established and founded upon a sense of British justice and equality. Why have the Government tampered with them? Having been returned to power by a large popular vote composed of both parties, this, of all Governments should have trusted the people.

This country is democratic, and one man's vote should be as good as his neighbor's and no better. In every state of the Union in which local option prevails the majority vote is considered sufficient. Under the Government of Mr Ross, local option could be carried by a majority. This was British fair play.

The majority vote is sufficient because the enforcement of local option does not depend upon a three-fifths majority, but upon the sincerity and efficiency of the officials appointed for the enforcement of the act, and upon the ability of the whole department from the Minister down.

Experience is against the contention of the Government that a three-fifths majority is necessary to insure enforcement. In nearly all of the many municipalities in which the act
