Work and vote for McCannel. He has no inducement to offer, except a promise of clean faithful service and strict attention to duty. As he says himself his determination is not to deprecate politics. Roll up a majority on 8th of June.

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The Nomination.

After a lonely vigil in the Town Hall from 12 till nearly 2 p. m. Returning Officer Grant on Monday morning, June 1st, with three nominations: Dr. Jamieson, Neil McCannel, Wm. Calder. The attendance was very slim. Dr. Jamieson moved, seconded by Mr. Calder that Mr. Grant be requested to accept the nomination of the elected candidate would have the law changed to as not to keep a man so long without his dinner!

Mr. McCannel was unable to be present owing to his accident, and Mr. Calder read a letter from him expressing bitter disappointment at his enforced absence and asking for earnest work on the part of his friends under the circumstances.

Dr. Jamieson came before them "for the first time as a government candidate" and proceeded to eulogize the government, with a fluency gained from his practice of the last few weeks. He began with the astonishing statement that they had kept all their promises but one, and seemed surprised that the Globe's editorials from their former in the main - friendly Government left a debt but now their successors had paid off the old more money was spent but it went to the people, and he discussed the various sources of revenue of the Province, inside and outside of the Dominion and advised by the constant statesmanship of Liberal government.

He took credit for doubling the tax on railways which brought more to the municipalities, for making better sales of timber on better system for better handling of Pulp wood etc. etc. and gave credit to the old Conservative Government for building the railway. They had found three lakes and they yielded millions, the Gilles limit was to be handed by the government and altogether it must have been a gift to everyone that financing Ontario was an easy matter when there were actual though everyone would not so readily think of the sowers of the seed, who were yielding the golden harvest.

The grant of \$130,000 of the people's money was criticized, reminded the \$250,000 to Can. Nor. Ry. and have objected in parliament not on point of view, but from one of five nary to complain that their opponents should have prevented them from passing bad legislation when they had a majority of 42, sounds funny. Now doesn't it?

He attacked the Review's "10 reasons for voting for McCannel" especially dealing with the Redistribution measure, the farmer claim and the one dealing with his own inconsistency in opposition and in power. That there was a Redistribution in all except for Northern Ontario, and all worse, when in at least one case it could be shown that a richer neighbor than he was, was already richer than he was, and he had already made the neighbor still larger.

This is only one case, perhaps the worst, but the tendency of the others is plainly to grab advantage.

He asked for a continuance of support on both his own account and on that of the Whitney government.

Mr. Calder followed and though only on about two hours' notice made an excellent speech. He commended the Liberal Press and people for the generous support they had given to Whitney in the early days of his power. No man ever had a better chance: Returned by a large majority, flattered by friend and foe, even by the Globe, he was placed in possession of the prize he fought for, was enabled to show the country the rascality of his predecessors and he found no scandal.

He went into the increases of expenditure quoting figures to prove his point, and set forth the pioneer work of the Liberals as to Succession, Duties, Corporation tax, tax on brewers and distillers, etc., etc.

He touched on the School law, and a slip he made drew from a few in the audience expressions of dissent which warned the meeting up. The vast Model Schools and the injury to the poor man by the proposed new Normal Schools was shown up. The large counting to the University without accounting the Lanes deal, - \$30,000 for costs and \$100,000 for information - were dealt with clearly as was the preparation in bringing down the ante of the Knuzie & Mann guarantee. These gentlemen were very useful to have around to give favors to at election time.

The gerrymander especially the grotesque dealing with Toronto, the liquor question and the three-fifths handicap; the political dodge of cheap school books, whether points touched for a strong opposition, voters were becoming more independent every sympathetic appeal for a hearty support of honest Neil McCannel on the 8th of June, and retired in his favor.

Dr. Jamieson took his privilege of a brief reply. He defended the School book legislation and expected Model Schools would be continued as long as there was demand for them. After a further reference to the Larose gift,

Will the Doctor be surprised to know that with such a provision he could have been defeated at all his elections. Just to show how it works we quote 1898, 1902 and 1905. The first column is the total, 2nd 3-5ths, the third vote for the 3-5ths gag have been in force against candidates.

All of which goes to prove that the 3-5ths requirement is a serious handicap.

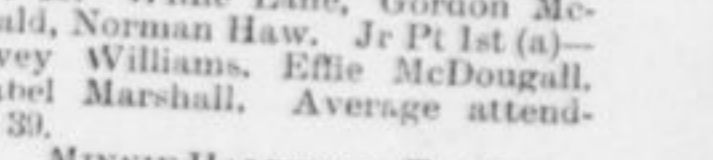
