How Street Cars Are Run

(Vancouver Saturday Sunset.) An exceptionally large audience was initiated on Tuesday evening into the mysteries of electricity as applied to street cars, very clearly and interesting in mining operations and bursting in mining operations and bursting Waller took the chair, and Mr. Sparling showed numerous lantern slides illustrating the lecture.

The lecturer began by saying that the principle of generating large power by electricity was really based on the simple magnet which it was found gave off at its poles what were known as "lines of force," unseen by the naked eye. The metallic path along which this current had to travel offered resistance, and it therefore became necessary to provide a sufficient amount of power to make the electricity travel along the high tension wire. The world volt was explained, named after Volta, the great Italian scientist. If one wire cuts one line of force and generates the fraction of one hundredth million of one volt, two wires would generate fifty million, and by adding wires it is easy to see how the power can be "stepped up" to 22,000 volts, which is about that generated at the manufacturing station at Lake Buntzen. Gigantic dynamos are in use in large cities, but the modern tendency is towards smaller size revolving at a greater speed but generating the same power. One shown on the screen can cut one hundred million lines of force, and represented a horse power of 5,000 to drive it. Setting Off Explosives.

There are two ways in which an explosive may be "set off"-by burning and by detonation. The burning process is progressive from one particle to another—as of fire in a grate, only infinitely more rapid. This process is adapted to gunpowder, requiring as it does a very short time for the burning up of the explosive body. The other form of explosion-the detonative-being at once throughout the mass, is unfitted for use in guns (which would be smashed to pieces), but is adapted to shattering, or break? charges in shells, torpedoes and submarine mines. Substances of the latter sort are termed high explosives Some examples may be given of the safety with which the most dangerous

explosives may ordinarily be handled For instance, a considerable quantity of guncotton (such as pure cotton treated with nitric acid) may be set fire, and will burn quietly. THE STRAWBERRY CROP

Dealers Predict a Bountiful Supply at a Price Within the Reach of All-How to Eat Strawberries and Enjoy

A glut in the strawberry market is the prediction of fruit dealers in nearly all sections of the country.
