**FATAL EXPLOSION.** - Mr. R. J. East, of Shelburne, was killed on Thursday last by the bursting of a soda fountain he was charging. He was blown out the door, head first, a distance of 15 feet. A boy named Anderson was with him and received injuries so serious that both arms may have to be amputated.

**SUDDEN DEATH.** - Mrs Elder, near Nenagh, died on Monday night very suddenly. Her husband had been officiating at the polling booth all day and as he and Mr Mal. McPhee were about starting for Holstein with the result, word was brought that she had been found dead in her chair. She was about 80 years of age.

Ballasting is proceeding rapidly on the C. P. R. at present, great train loads of gravel from "the Glen" passing here several times a day. They are now near Hanover and it is expected a service will be instituted here before completion to Walkerton, which point is looking for service about September next.

English, of Glascoot, a few miles west of Markdale, had an experience he will not soon forget. A thunder storm suddenly broke over him, and a valuable team which he was driving were struck by lightning, while he himself fell insensible from the shock. ## Cement Works Closed.

We announced last week on the strength of an inquiry at the office that the Cement Works were not closing down but running light until connection was made with the Hanover deposit. This it appears was a mistake, for they are closed, temporarily of course, and we believe the machinery and fixtures at the lake end will now be removed leaving as a permanent reminder of unfulfilled hopes, a graded but rail-less track to Wilder's Lake.

## A POLITICAL LANDSLIDE.

Whitney's Majority increased to 69 seats, while Dr. Jamieson suffers a decrease of 147 in S. Grey.

The country has spoken and very decisively. Its verdict is plainly that a second term must be given to the Hon. J. P. Whitney. The prophets are all astray. Every one we read or heard of conceded a reduction of some kind, even the News and Mr Whitney himself. Not in the wildest flights of imagination did anyone guess the majority would be increased, and increased very materially, yet such is the case and the lesson of the defeat has to be learned in the hard school of opposition adversity.

That Mr Whitney's redistribution measure and the peculiar fixing of the Toronto Constituencies had an influence on the result, is certain, that there were some sinister influences at work may well be believed, but it is idle to deny that the voice is not that of the voice of conviction in the country. The majority is too large, even Conservatives will admit, and the Premier must feel that on him rests a tremendous responsibility to "make good" to the measure of the splendid support given him.

We do not believe that the result means a justification of the legislation passed in the dying hours of last session, though it may well be taken as condemnation of the course of the opposition in allowing it to go through so easily. There should be a stern resolve that never again by any party should there be an attempt to "railroad through" measures which have around them elements of suspicion.

Hon. A. G. Mackay put up a remarkable fight, but he was practically alone, and on that account it is gratifying to see him elected. Never before did a leader make such a strenuous struggle with voice and pen and we believe Ontario has not yet duly recognized the worth that is behind them. He was up against the feeling: "give him a second chance, you're a young man, you can wait."

The victory of Duncan C. Ross, who left a sure riding to contest doubtful North Middlesex, is a crumb of comfort for the Liberals. Thousands of Liberals who must have voted Whitney, will yet rejoice to see the son of the late leader showing the father's spirit. The loss of Pense in Kingston and of C. N. Smith of Sault Ste. Marie is a serious loss to McKay in debating strength.

Hossack, the letter-writer, is defeated in N. Toronto, and while the grits would have liked the seat all right, there is no great grief over the loser. Monteith, Min. of Agriculture, is among the slain, and will not likely rise again.

Dr Jamieson has won by 263 and we rather plume ourselves on our estimate made morning of voting day and sealed up till 10 p. m., giving him 255. He has lost ground in Glenelg, Bentinck, Hanover, Normanby, Neustadt and Egremont, and has gained only in Durham, Proton and Dundak. The most surprising change is in Normanby, where McCannel knocked off about 100. On the other hand McCannel's friends expected a majority in Proton but it jumped from 25 to 53 the wrong way.

It is safe to say that had McCannel had a longer campaign, and had not met with the check of his accident, the majority would have been smaller, if indeed there would have been one at all. All honor to McCannel who stepped into the breach at the last moment and reduced the majority while the rest of the country was evidently swinging the other way. There will be no recount.

## Election Day.

The weather was all that could be desired and in marked contrast to the 1905 election which was a bitter zero day.

Horseflesh was in demand, of course, but there was no excitement. Some sweating was done in Divisions 2 and 3. As the Durham polls were announced and the doctor had the even 200, rejoicing began, and the more enthusiastic repaired to the two camps in the Town Hall and Calder's Hall to await returns.

Very early it was seen that the country was going more decidedly Conservative, but the grits in Calder's Hall took a crumb of comfort over the election of Mackay the defeat of Mini-
