Worth Knowing.

A soft flannel cloth and saled water should be used for cleaning matting. If there are spots which are soiled rub them first with dampened cornmeal then wash the matting with a soft flannel cloth and cool salt water, allowing a quart of salt to each pail of water. Lastly, wipe off all moisture with a damp cloth. Matting kept clean in this memner will not turn yellow.

The next time you wash the glass ware rinse in hot water and plunge the articles in a bucket of water in which there is a cupful of clear starch. Keep the starch stirred through the water. Put the glassware on towels to drain and leave until perfectly dry. Rub with a soft cloth and you will be delighted to see how bright are the pieces. Have a soft brush to clean the cut-glass arti-

Put a few drops of ammonia on a rag to rub finger marks from looking glasses or windows. When stewing fruit never use a metal spoon; a wooden spoon is best, and
