Principal of Knox Announces His Retirement.

Report of Home Missions, Western Section.

Winnipeg despatch: Exchanges of felicitations, bearing reports of colleges and considering reviews of the home mission work occupied the attention of the Presbyterian General Assembly today, and much important business was transacted.

The reading of the letter of resignation from Dr. MacLaren, the revered principal of Knox College, provoked a demonstration of the assembly's loyalty and devotion to the aged educationist, who for 35 years has assisted actively in preparing young men for the Christian ministry, and the leaders of the gathering joyfully and spontaneously in a tribute to his great qualities of mind and heart.

Devotional exercises occupied a large portion of the morning session, and the business was principally routine. Applications from thirty-one ministers of other churches, who desired to be taken into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church, were received and a committee was appointed to consider them.

FRANCE ALL EXCITEMENT

Over the Attempted Shooting of Major Dreyfus.

One Man Offers to Murder Him—Editorial Vituperation.

Paris, June 8.—Whether yesterday's attempt upon the life of Major Alfred Dreyfus at the time of the canonizing of Emile Zola in the Pantheon was only the individual act of a man believing himself to be an outraged patriot or had behind it an incipient nationalist plot, the Republican press are unanimous in deploring the incident, and believes it injured, rather than aided, that cause.
