Need for Closure.

The systematic obstruction which is being practised by the Conservative Opposition in the Canadian House of Commons would be impossible in the British House of Commons, and the sooner it is rendered impossible in the Canadian House of Commons the better for Canada.

So writes the Ottawa Free Press and goes on to show the action of the British parliament back in the 80's when they introduced closure to prevent purely factional obstruction by a minority.

It closes an able article by quoting May, a well-known authority on Parliamentary procedure as follows: The rules of Parliament are designed to afford every legitimate opportunity for discussion, to ensure reasonable delays in the passing of important measures, and to guard the rights of minorities; and freedom of debate has been maintained and observed by the rules and usages of both Houses with rare patience and self-denial.

Canada to-day is not quite under the domination of a small minority; but it will be if something drastic is not done to curb Hon. George E. Foster (who does more talking than forty average members put together) and those among the Opposition who copy the Hon. gentleman.

Can't Trust Whitney

That good Conservative paper, the Bruce Times, published in Walkerton, evidently doesn't believe the Premier when he stated at Hamilton that whether Grit or Tory was returned it would make no difference in the bestowal of government favors.

And now that we have thrown down the gauntlet and taken up Mr. Truax, what are we to do? What will Mr. Truax do for this riding? What did he do in 12 years with the Government behind him? What will he do, or what can he do, in Opposition? An answer to these questions will show that South Bruce is in a bad way.

Shillington, the successful opponent of Mr. Angus McKelvie, and others used the same line of argument before the election, notwithstanding Mr. Whitney's professions of boldness and honesty.

Premier Whitney would have been better off with a majority of twenty-five than he will be carrying the burden of a majority of sixty-eight. His followers will be emboldened to scoff at discipline, and to disregard a leadership which the weakness of the Opposition seems to render unnecessary.

Mr Whitney has dispensed with the ordinary arts of the politician. He has talked to the public in a manner that has filled them with astonishment. On the stump he has, apparently, thrown discretion to the winds by blurring out frank expressions of opinion on subjects that Sir Oliver Mowat and Hon. G. W. Ross treated with the most delicate caution.

Clover Seed a Profitable Crop for the Farmer.

As was predicted a year ago, there has been a decided shortage of clover seed this spring. A light crop in Europe, the United States and Canada caused the stocks for this spring's trade to be abnormally low, and this resulted in unusually high prices for good seed.

At present the indications are that the foreign exporting countries will not produce more than an average crop of clover seed, and the Ontario supply is likely to be short. In some sections of Ontario the clover crop was seriously affected by drought last season, and the amount available for seed production may be limited.

In view of the conditions cited, the advisability of utilizing every available clean field, or part of field, for clover seed purposes is urged. In growing clover and grass seed for the market, it is important to bear in mind that the standard of purity demanded for seed of first quality has substantially increased.

The first step in the production of good clover and grass seeds is to procure the cleanest possible seed. It is used on clean land and is followed by a thorough system of weeding in the field, the product will be clean. The field weeding is of prime importance, although it is often overlooked.

With red clover the best results are obtained by pasturing, or cutting the first crop early. This allows a stronger second growth for the seed crop and also lessens the danger of damage from the clover hatter.

The clover hatter is the best machine for threshing aske and red clover, but the ordinary grain separator will do the work fairly well if properly regulated.
