Artemesia Council.

Artemesia township council met as a Court of Revision on Saturday last, all the members were present, the Reeve in the chair. After taking the necessary oath only one case of appeal was brought before the Court, that of R. Genes, who appealed against the assessment on lots 27, 28, 29, 30, 31. The roll was sustained.

Consent then was for the transaction of ordinary business. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Reports were received from the Reeve on ditching and putting in culvert at lot 192, T. & S. R. township Artemesia and Froton; and from Mr McKenzie re Mrs F. T. Carr's complaint.

Wright—Carson—That Mr McKenzie's report re opening Canachers street in Eugenia be accepted and that he be paid \$2 for his services, also \$2 for other committee services rendered.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carson—That the Reeve's report re ditching and putting in large culvert on township Artemesia, and Froton be received and that he be paid \$4.50 for his services in connection therewith.—Carried.

Wright—Best—That Geo. Pritchard be paid \$2.00 for repairs to grader and plow, and J. I. Graham \$60 for double tree for grader.—Carried.

McKenzie—Carson—That C. W. Bellamy be paid the balance of his salary as assessor, amounting to \$52.00.—Carried.

Carson—Wright—That the account of Sawyer & Massey for bit and bolts for road grader, amounting to \$8.50, be paid.—Carried.

McKenzie—Best—That Henry Fenwick be paid the sum of \$6.88 for work done in Eugenia as certified by pathmaster of 1907, and the amount be charged to unexpended State Labor money in the treasury to the credit of Eugenia road division.—Carried.

Carson—McKenzie—That D. Whyte be paid \$3 for taking two inmates to House of Refuge.—Carried.

Carson—Best—That the communication of Miss Kate McKinnon re statute labor be referred to the Priceville police trustees.—Carried.

McKenzie—Wright—That the Clerk be instructed to communicate with the Secretary of the Georgian Bay Power Co., calling attention to the company's failure to comply with the requirements of agreement with this Council, and soliciting reasons for delay in developing the enterprise at Eugenia.—Carried.

Wright—Carson—That in pursuance of sec. 617 A. of the Municipal Act, 1908, a bridge over the Beaver river at lots 23 and 25 on the line between the 18th and 14th concessions of the Township of Artemesia be 300 feet and over in length, and owing to the said bridge being 300 feet or over in length and owing to the said bridge being used by the inhabitants of municipalities other than those of the said Township, and being situated on a highway which is an important road affording means of communication to several municipalities, it is unjust that the said Township of Artemesia should be liable for the maintenance and repair of the said bridge and that it

should be repaired by the Corporation of the County of Grey, and that application be made to the Judge of the County Court of the County of Grey for an order declaring said bridge to be a county bridge, the same to be maintained and kept in repair by the said County Corporation.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advance.
