### LETTERS to the EDITOR

Editor Review:

In the last report of the Dairy-men's Associations, which has just come to hand, are a few very valuable addresses which every farmer would do well to read, study and put into practice. The following is a summary of an address by Mr H. Glendenning of Manilla, on the "Cheap Production of Milk."

The main idea in the production of milk is to get conditions as near like the month of June as possible, when the cow is not troubled with the flies, the intense heat, the drouth and has abundance of fresh grass to eat.

In composition milk contains almost 13 lbs dry matter of which 3.6 lbs is protein. Having such a large percentage of protein it is evident that to produce a large quantity of milk there must be abundance of protein in the feed. And now the question is, "Which feeds shall I use to get the required amount of protein and give bulk and succulency to the food?" Corn silage contains 21 per cent dry matter and is therefore excellent. It is also bulky and palatable and is an excellent food for the foundation of a ration. It is very low in protein, however, and this element must be supplied from some other source. Wheat bran is rich in protein but its price is so high that its use is out of the question. The source of protein best suited to the farmer is Alfalfa clover and can be grown and housed for \$2 per ton. This clover is almost as rich in protein as bran and is certainly very much cheaper.

It grows best on high rolling land where the ice will not form to kill the plants. The soil should be in good condition and in good state of cultivation. Use land that has had a hoe crop the year previous. Do not plow it but work up a shallow seed bed and get a fine tith on the surface. Sow about 3 pecks of barley per acre as a nurse crop and from 15 to 30 lbs clover per acre. If sowing with a drill sow the clover in front of the drill so that it will be covered between the rows of barley. On ground that has never grown alfalfa before it is well to get a culture from the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph, and apply to the seed according to directions sent with the culture. This will insure a better crop. This clover may be cut 2 or 3

times each season. The first crop hard to cure properly because of the wet weather. Cut when about one-tenth the blossoms are out in full bloom. Cut in the forenoon as soon as the dew is off and ted it as soon as cut and again immediately after dinner if a tedder is at hand. In any case rake it before the dew forms in the evening. Put into coils and allow it to stand for 3 or four days. Spread out the coils at the end of this time and draw it in. If it rains while in the coils you may have to wait another day or so. Do not allow to get too dry before raking or the leaves will fall off and the best of your clover gone.

Thus we see that Mr Glendenning uses as his ration mainstay—corn silage and alfalfa clover hay. He also uses a few roots. By Protein we mean the nitrogen compounds. In milk it is commonly called "curd" and in meats "lean meat" or "muscle." Therefore the foods which are good milk producers ought to be, and are, good beef producers. Why not try growing alfalfa? If it pays Mr Glendenning, it ought to pay you.
