Niagara Camp Notes.

Arrived safely in Camp after a pleasant sail on the Steamer Cayuga. The weather was delightful, the water calm and glistening in the glorious sunshine evading.

A large camp is again assembled of infantry, cavalry and artillery, from the appearance of the tents it is the largest ever.

D. Co., Durham, were the first to arrive, G. Co., Clarksburg, having to be left at Yonge St. wharf for lack of accommodations till next boat. The company was joined at Niagara by Mr. Geo. R. Midford, who is presently a Bugle Sergt. but since coming has been promoted to the position of Staff Sergeant (Orderly Room Clerk) being proficient in the typewriter.

Capt. Rorke, of G. Co., is here from Ottawa to instruct his men from Clarksburg.

The Companies from O. Sound and Fisherton have not yet arrived, they going by Hamilton and S. Catherines.

The same old scenes, the same old places, old sounds and "Old John Peel" salutes the ear as usual while writing this, by a Band just arriving in Camp. Allan McFarlane, Cook for the Band, promises to be the right man in the right place, while Charlie Saunders and his assistants, Harry Wilson, will no doubt sustain their reputation as Cooks for the Co.

The Sun is now setting on the first day of Camp, everything is lovely so far. I cannot say as much for those that are to come, but hope for the best.

What a study of human nature here, as many different varieties as there are of faces, from the quiet and placid, to the noisy and turbulent spirits who seem to lose all control of themselves when away from home surroundings, and spending a stirring and strenuous life in camp, a soldiering.

The evil effects of the baneful canren is plainly evident in many cases. That Government that would take steps to eradicate this alioy prevalent evil here, would be conferring a great benefit as well as making a record for themselves that will be ashamed of.

As you will have seen ere this by the Toronto Press, who have a tent on the grounds near the site of the old Military Hospital and Indian Council House, our bandmaster Hawthorne has been excused from further service and been given a transport for home. He raised perhaps a well founded kick on arriving in Camp owing to lack of an expected marquee but unfortunately carried it too far, in opposition to much kindly advice and counsel to exercise patience with the old story of taking life in one's own hand. It is generally conceded he was lucky in not falling into Col Denison's hands who is here as C. S. O.

The band is getting on fine however under Wm. Johnston, now created Captain by the Colonel. The band as you may be aware, feel terribly scandalized but are showing great kindness and sympathy and offers of assistance and music, by neighboring bandmas with a spontaneity that stirs a chord in the human heart which seems entirely foreign to such rough surroundings. Severe Electric Storms.

Seldom has this locality been visited with such storms as have taken place since last Friday. The storm that Monday night was bad, but the double one of Tuesday night was far more severe. It rained as if there were a cloud burst, and during much of the time there were gorgeous electrical displays, enough to be dangerous. Tuesday night there was a repetition of Monday's storm, but the rain was over.

Among the casualties are the following: Duncan Campbell, Bentinck, horse killed by lightning. Wm. Caldwell, a horse drowned on the way to wauover, by plunging headlong into a culvert which had burst open by torrents; the travellers being conveyed and boy driver, had a rough experience, hats and some grips being lost and a forced walk to Hanover. Those who have seen the spot say it is 10 feet deep and the water was level with the road at time of accident. Men and horses were swept down 50 feet. There might easily have been a fatality. Bentinck Council it is thought will be liable.

The C. P. R. train went Monday night for the first load of coal, but found the track covered with gravel, and had to return.

Injuries have been done to chimneys and residences in many places; Mr. Sharp's of Glenelg, Mr. Hawthorne's and Mrs. Burnett's in town being struck. Telephone lines are again demoralized and several barns in Sullivan are reported destroyed. Mr. Thos. Ritchie's barn was also injured.

Monday night's storm was accompanied by hail, which with the wind would be bad for fall wheat. Low and level fields were covered with water. On the whole, however the rains will do immense good and at no time for many years has the prospect seemed so bright.

During Tuesday's storm Mr. Lech, McLean's team, frightened by lightning, made off up street, dashed through the obstructions at each end of the condemned bridge and broke the wagon in part before being caught. Had the bridge been torn down as it will be in a few days, there would have been a dead team.
