Elsewhere will be found an abstract of the address delivered by this prominent politician last week. Most of his auditors we feel sure would admit that sometimes he was "wild" and wide of the mark and indulging in an "exhibition" that would not have been given had a member of the government or even the despised H. H. Miller been present.

Readers of parliamentary reports would notice his unfairness in making reference to the method followed by Manitoba in preparing voters' lists, while he was condemning the Election Bill. In Ontario our lists are made from the non-partizan assessment roll, in Manitoba by appointees of the Conservative government.

Again, while in imagination rolling up millions of debt he was careful to avoid comparing the increases in the Conservative period which were enormously in excess of the 12 years of Liberal rule. The disparity would be even greater if the "value received" in each case were considered. The net debt in 1897 was \$261,538,596. Twelve years before it was \$182,161,850, an increase of \$79,376,746, or at the rate of over six million a year. From 1896 to 1907 the debt had increased from \$258,497,433 to \$263,671,860 or at the rate of less than \$500,000 a year.

It surely is worth mentioning when revelling in stories of increasing expenditure to point out that increasing revenues make it possible and still leave a surplus. Besides for the increased expenditure there is something to show. Mr Foster must know he is prevaricating when he says the Liberals promised to extinguish all duties. At no time did they promise this. They knew the country needed a revenue tariff and proclaimed it. We are not prepared to say how much but we are sure that had the tariff been kept as before 1896, the surplus would have been much greater than they were. Canada has prospered as never before and not one in that audience were sure would exchange his prospects in 1908 for those of 1896. Mr Foster contradicts himself when he grows at increasing expenditure and yet boasts that the opposition have control of the purse strings. The country will do well to keep Mr Foster in a position to criticize expenditure rather than allow him to make it.

His references to H H Miller were not relished by many Conservatives, who favored no opposition to our present members at this time at all, especially when these references were absolutely untrue; to say practically that Miller is a mere work machine is absurd. In only two weeks ago he showed his independence by opposing even the Minister of Justice on the Cigarette Bill, and what he more carried his point that the minimum age should be 18 not 16.

Mr Foster also knew that during the present session in a strong and independent speech, in opposition to the views of the leaders of both political parties, he earnestly advocated the abolition of the Senate. We believe in this the general public—Liberal and Conservative—were with him and we hope he will continue the agitation. Mr Foster gave no assistance. It was simply a riddle to him to bring forward a party man as Mr Foster to score for lack of independence. Mr Miller, who, for a man in his first parliament, has shown a remarkable and unusual degree of independence.

Mr Miller has had initiative. Mr Foster well knows he has independence, his constituents know of his industry and his interest in their welfare. Not only has he been independent in the House but out of the House as well. In South Grey he has been attentive, helpful and obliging to Liberals and Conservatives alike. He has assisted very many Conservatives in connection with their North West homesteads, has helped Conservative postmasters without any regard to their politics considering only the convenience of the people and the good of the service. He has in fact served, not any political party but the people and all the people, without partiality and without distinction as to their political leanings or religious creeds. He has served them faithfully and well and acquired the well earned reputation of being one of the most regular attendants and hardest workers in the House of Commons. That his work is efficient is proved by the fact that he has been twice elected to the chairmanship of the Committee of Banking and Commerce, and in the fight for the Lord's Day Act, Sir Wilfrid and Mr Shearer too, freely conceded that Mr Miller's help had been of great value. Instances might be multiplied. There's another reason for Mr Foster's personal bitterness to Mr Miller which must be left for the future.

Mr Foster is a talking machine, rather than Borden is responsible for the obstruction over the Elections Bill, and we venture to say that he will allow measures to pass in as many hours these closing days as are just as much or as little worth months of talk as was the Elections Bill.

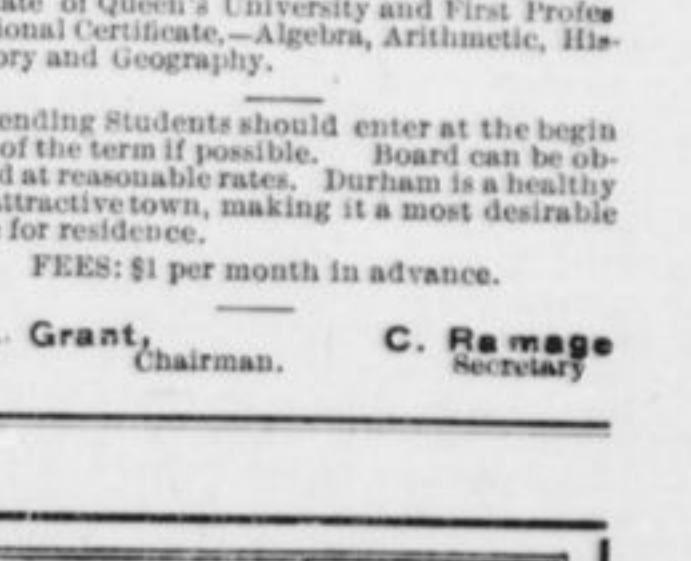
