'EAST IN A PLANT

But It Can Be Seen as Such Only With the Microscope.

Yeast is a small plant which can seen only with the aid of the microsco; says Good Health. There are two varie ties, wild and cultivated, for these tiny plants can be improved through cultiva-

tion as larger plants can be. Firms which make yeast for the market must grow these plants quite as carefully as the florist grows his flow-Care must be taken that they do not become mixed with other varieties, therefore destroying the culture.

In some laboratories where yeast is grown two separate buildings are kept for this purpose. These are ooth carefully disinfected, and if it is found that the yeast becomes contaminated in one uilding the culture is started anew and the other building, previously disinfect-


