A Hopeful Outlook.

Editor Review: Every farmer, merchant, banker, and in fact, all others are interested in the various crops of Canada. The report on "The Crops and Live Stock of Canada," as published in the "Census and Statistics Monthly," is interesting and instructive. This journal is published by the Census and Statistics office and its aim is to give reliable reports on the different Canadian crops. The data are gathered from all parts of the Dominion and sent in by practical farmers who are well up in their profession.

With practically no exceptions the farmers are not handicapped with a late seeding season nor blessed with a dry spring, — a fine growing season following the seeding which makes crops now look their best. There is a large increase in the acreage of wheat sown but taken all round the crop is scarcely up to normal with the possible exceptions of Saskatchewan and Manitoba. The largest increase in the area of oats is seen in Ontario and the crop is up to the average obtained. There are in Canada over 1,000,000 more acres of oats than of wheat. Barley is considered below the standard and the increase in acreage has been very slight. While Alberta is this year growing 21,635 acres more than last year, Ontario is 23,007 acres behind. There is scarcely any increase in the acreage of peas and mixed grain and the crops are somewhat below normal.

Hay and clover form the largest area of any crop in Canada. It covers over 8,000,000 acres which is about 500,000 more than last year. The crop somewhat below standard but pastures have been reported as good all over the Dominion.

Live stock is reported in good condition notwithstanding the hard season last year. That crops are good all over the Dominion is evinced by the fact that in all classes of stock, except swine there is a large increase in the number kept. The majority of farmers were so keen to get rid of their swine last fall that the number this year is decreased by about 75,000.

In Ontario we find all crops are looking well and promise a good yield, with the possible exception of Spring Wheat and late Barley. There is a total of almost 400,000 acres more under crop and over 400,000 live stock more in Ontario this year than last. These reports published for June show that the farmers are not discouraged by last year's poor crops.
