## A Large Death Roll.

Mrs J. W. Scott. Friday last, 7th August, there passed away very suddenly, but at the ripe age of 77 years, one of the pioneers of Durham, Mrs J. W. Scott, Upper town.

For several years past she has been subject, at intervals, to fainting spells, from which she gradually rallied until this last one, when the worn frame at last gave way and she passed to her rest. She had taken dinner with her son Robert and had been feeling about as usual all the forenoon but, about two o'clock, the attack came which in less than half an hour proved fatal. A doctor was summoned and neighbors were attentive, but human aid was unavailing. Her son Robert, ever faithful, was with her at the last, and surely no mother was ever more dutifully attended to during her declining years than was Mrs. Scott by her son for, as the writer had ample means of knowing, no daughter's hand could have dealt more gently with the aged one or rendered her more comfort.

Mrs Scott, whose name was Isabella Deustow, was born in Devonshire, England, in 1831, and came to this country with her parents in her infancy, they settling near St. Catharines and Dundas. She was married at Dundas at the age of 16 to Mr John Scott, who predeceased her forty years ago. They came to Durham in 1849 and consequently were among the very earliest settlers. He owned considerable property here and engaged in store-keeping for a time. To them were born six sons and two daughters five of whom survive as follows: Robt. at home, John in Toronto, Charles in Winnipeg; Mrs Milan and Mrs Carter both in Rochester.

Deceased was a delightful old lady; chatty, cheerful and obliging. She was intensely loved by her children and was devoted to them and their interests to the last. She was buried in Trinity Church graveyard on Monday amid many tokens of respect, Rev Mr Bice conducting the services. The pall bearers were: C. L. Grant, Robt Cochran, Geo. Kress, F. Lenahan, W. B. Villet and C. Ramage.

Mrs Scott was the oldest living resident of Durham. Few, if any, except the Hunters and McNabs were here before her, so that her removal is another link severed from the chain binding the past to the present.

WILLIAM CAMERON. Startling and painful was the news that reached Durham on Friday morning by wire that William Cameron had died, suddenly that day.

When death comes to the aged there is sorrow and a sigh, but when the young and the strong is taken there is grief deep and acute.

For some months back he had been in poor health, but no fatal termination was looked for, at least so soon, consequently the blow falls heavy on his devoted mother and loving sisters and brothers. His brother James, his sisters Misses Kate and Bell, his cousins Mrs Parker and young Mr Ross accompanied the remains to Durham.

Mr Jas. McK. Robertson, Secy. of the McLean Publishing Co., and an intimate friend was also present on behalf of Col. J. B. McLean (who was not at home) and representing the Company.

Deceased was a young man of about 29 years, and held an important position in the big publishing firm and gave promise of a useful career. Sincere sympathy is extended to the sorrowing mother and other relatives.

MR. ROBERT MILLS. Our Dornoch correspondent fittingly refers to the sudden and lamented death of Mr Robt. Mills, at Tilbury on Friday last. The Review extends condolences.

ROBERT MORRISON. Just two weeks after his mother's death, Robt. Morrison passed away suddenly at the home of his brother in Egrement on Saturday last. He was sitting reading when he suddenly took some kind of a spasm and died in a short time. He returned from the west about two years ago and we understand has not had very good health since. He was about 50 years of age and unmarried.

MRS. JAMES LAIDLAW. Still another to the death roll this week, and another of the links which the past broken. The above lady passed away on Sunday morning last after a brief illness of a few days, with congestion of the lungs, from which

25,000 Men Wanted for Western Harvesting.

To meet as far as possible the unusual demand for farm laborers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, the Canadian Pacific Railway will run special second class excursions from all Ontario stations. Cost of a one-way ticket to Winnipeg is \$10.00 and from Winnipeg to points where and from which laborers will be carried without charge. After at least one month's work in the harvest field, a ticket back to Ontario starting point will be issued at \$15.00. Tickets are only good on Farm Laborers' special trains, and will be issued to women, but no half-rate for children. Leaving dates of excursions are as follows:—

August 14th and Sept. 8th, from all stations on Toronto-Sarnia line and south thereof (in Canada.)

August 22nd and Sept. 11, from all stations east of Toronto-North Bay line, to and including Kingston.

For the three excursions in August special trains will be run from all points on the C. P. R. If you are in any doubt as to date of excursion from your district apply to local C. P. R. agent, who will also furnish times of special trains, or write to C. B. Foster, District Passenger Agent, C. P. R., Toronto.
