Dr Mahan Nominated.

Under the above heading the Chronicle of Howard, Sask., has the following relating to Dr Mahan, well-known in Durham, as the son-in-law of Mr Norman McIntyre: We congratulate our friend on the hearty unanimity of his choice and the confidence his fellow-citizens repose in him. The paper says:—

A Convention of the supporters of the Provincial Rights party in the constituency of Francis was held at Sloughton on Wednesday afternoon to select a candidate for the forthcoming election. The constituency was well represented. Mr Westgate, of Francis, was appointed chairman of the convention. Six nominations were made as follows: F. M. Gates and Dr Mahan, of Fillmore; D. Donnelly and Ed. Slater, of Sloughton; Dr Connell, of Tyvan, and F. J. Woods, of Howard. Dr Mahan was unable to be present owing to professional business, but he wired his acceptance of the candidacy. Upon receipt of the doctor's acceptance the other nominees declined to stand, and Dr Mahan was made the unanimous choice of the convention without a vote.

Dr Mahan is well known and popular throughout the constituency; a man of sound judgment and business ability, he should make a creditable showing at the polls.

Referring to this Convention the Winnipeg Telegram says:—

"The most enthusiastic Convention of Provincial Rights for Francis was held at Sloughton this afternoon. Upwards of 100 delegates were present and the utmost enthusiasm prevailed. Several names were put before the meeting, but all withdrew in favor of Dr Mahan, of Fillmore, who was immediately wired at his home, and when the acceptance came it was received with ringing cheers. Everything points to a great victory for the provincial righters in this constituency."

Re Faint-hearted Immigrants.

The Toronto Star referring to the anomaly of hundreds of idle men in the cities while farmers are pinched for help, comes to the conclusion that the pioneer spirit is declining, and contrasts the past with the present in this fashion:—

"In these days, when new arrivals from the Old Land complain so loudly of the difficulty of obtaining work, or of the sort of labor offered, it is well to occasionally call to mind the conditions which the first arrivals in this Province, the ancestors of the generation of today, were forced to meet. Some eighty years ago a family settled in what was then a dense bush fifteen miles north-west of Barrie. This family consisted of the two aged grandparents and a lad of seven or eight. The grandfather, a stationer by trade, knew absolutely nothing of bush life, or even of ordinary farming, while the grandchild was for a time a burden rather than a help. But they all had grit, and they held on. The grandchild of eighty years since is today himself a grandfather, and all about him are descendants living in comfort on well tilled farms, with bank barns and brick houses. Some what later a young couple landed in the woods to the north of Guelph. The husband had no practical knowledge of anything connected with farm life. They, too, had steel in the fibre and red blood in the veins. To-day the woods have beautiful homes and are leaders in one of the finest agricultural sections of the Province.

In view of what has been accomplished in the past under conditions which make the trials and difficulties of to-day seem but as a summer picnic, and in view of the opportunities still open for those who are prepared to go to work in earnest, one is tempted to ask if the pioneer spirit is declining. The men who laid the foundations of Ontario would have made light of things which appear as insuperable obstacles to some of the present generation. The need seems to be not better opportunities, but the courage necessary to seize the opportunities which are open.

Less Debt Per Capita.

The increase of the net debt from 1878 to 1890, a period of eighteen years of Conservative rule, was \$118,135,000, an average of \$6,573,000 per year. The increase of the net debt under the Liberal Government from 1890 to 1908, twelve years, was \$19,474,376, an average increase per year of \$1,622,000. A considerable portion of this was occasioned by the Transcontinental railway. The net debt in 1890, last year of Conservative rule, was \$50.82 per head of population, and the net debt in 1908 is \$42.84 per head.

Consider This Contrast.

As an evidence of careful management of the public moneys, the Conservatives in eighteen years expended \$198,000,000 on capital and special expenditures. To do this they had to borrow \$118,000,000. In twelve years the Liberals have spent \$102,000,000 for the same purposes, and only added \$19,000,000 to the public debt. That is, \$143,000,000 was expended for these purposes and provided out of ordinary revenue.

Philip—Lothian—That we accept of the tender of R. Grafton for the construction of McNair's bridge at \$301.00. Municipality to supply all necessary timber.—Carried.

Road Comrs, reports Comr. Lothian reported having spent \$115 in his division chiefly by days' labor in charge of a pathmaster, consisting of grading and graveling and some necessary repairs. Com. fees \$6.00, Comr Hunter reported spending \$110.90 in his division as above, Com. fees \$12.00, Comr Ferguson reported an expenditure of \$56.25 in his division, chiefly by days' labor, Com. fees \$4.00.

Comr Philip reported spending \$176.30 in his division mostly by days labor. Com. fees \$7.50. As the Township of Egremont has been instrumental in obtaining Legislation to have the assessment made in October and the rolls to be returned April 30th following it was resolved that we ask for applications for assessor at our next meeting, for making the assessment of the township for 1909 as aforesaid and a By-Law be prepared to that effect also a supplementary By-Law to issue debentures for the deficit on drain No 1. E. & P. and a By-Law to levy the rates for 1908.—Carried.

The Plains of Abraham.

Through the magnanimous and persistent efforts of Earl Grey, the Governor General of Canada, a large amount of money has been raised to make it practicable to preserve as a public park the battleground on the Plains of Abraham, near Quebec city, where General Wolfe and General Montcalm met death while contending in a decisive battle for the possession of Canada in 1759. Victory declared for the British, but defeat left no stain on the memory of the defeated. Many years ago a joint monument was erected to commemorate the two generals. One of the pathetic incidents of the celebration was the laying of two wreaths on Wolfe's monument, one to the memory of Wolfe by a descendant of Montcalm, and one to the memory of Montcalm by a relative of Wolfe. As the scene of the celebration, and especially of the historical pageants, the Plains of Abraham will henceforth possess a new interest for Canadian and foreign tourists.—Ex.
